Khartum, Mar. 16.-To-day Mi Roosevelt and party visited Omdurman. The hills of Kerreri, seven miles from Omdurman, mark the site of the great battle of Omdurman or September 2, 1898, when the khalifa's

The trip to Omdurman was made in the sirdar's yacht Elfin and the other seven miles north of Kerreri on 1 donkeyback.
