PULPIT EDITORIAL - No 2 Men for the Ministry

What is the ideal of the Christian ministry for the present day? Must it be priestly or prophetic, a profession or a vocation? There is nothing more fundamental to the welfare of the Church today than a correct answer to this question.

Over the door-way to acceptance for the Christian ministry in every Church of the land should be these words "cursed be he that entereth unanointed of God". In this day of such momentous moral upheaval, such terrific social struggle, and such splendid spiritual opportunity, there can be no greater sin than the sin of that man, who, assuming the spiritual leadership of a Church of Jesus Christ, denies the spirit and purpose of his Gospel, by spending his time and energies in the petty fussiness of "keeping up the services".

No man who is alive can fail to see that the old order is tottering to its ruin, as surely as did ancient Rome before the oncoming Goths. "The old order changeth giving place to new". It is the task of the true minister to lead the groping, burdened, bewildered multitude out into the light of living hope and into courageous but bloodless battle for a better day.

Let it be fearlessly said that THE MINISTER BETRAYS HIS TRUST if he is not a leader in the struggle for economic freedom. It is his voice that must call men to raise up and break their bondage—his hand that must point for men the picture of the fairer life that is possible even now.

phets said "if they persecuted me they will also persecute you". Yes politics is muddy, but if politics is too muddy for the hands of the prophet of God then whose hands shall dare to touch it? If the minister be indeed a prophet of God he has some-thing to say that the world badly needs to hear, and neither pious sentimentality nor carping criticism should deter him from saying it.

The man who enters this service must be pre-eminently a man of spiritual insight and vision. He must know God, he must live in God's presence, be moved by his Spirit and sustained by his Power. He must bring his message from the God whose nature is holiness and love. In the furnace of his own true soul, ethics and ideals must fuse in holy passion.

He must be a challenge and not an apology. Sometimes he will have an holy impudence, and he will sound the note of defiance. But only the man who has faith can so speak. Not a faith gotten from books, a creed but a faith beaten out of life through labour and prayer and tears, a living faith. Faith in God, faith in himself as the messenger of God, faith in men—in their spiritual possibilities, and faith in his message that it is the eternal truth of God, faith in the future that it will be one more move nearer the goal of the divine purpose.

He must know the struggles and sorrows of men's lives, the things that break men's hearts and sour their souls.

He must be a man among men taking his own way in the world, expecting no homage no deference, no respect from his fellows that he is not prepared to win. He must deserve what he gets, and get what he deserves.

His message must be part of himself, living and human. It must be positive, direct in its appeal, pointed in its application, frank and fearless in its expression.

It must conceal nothing, shirk nothing keep back nothing. For such a man there will be large room, and a ready hearing. And the Church that he leads will never lack a field of service or heroic workers.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF HIGHLAND PARK AMENDING CHAPTER XVI OF THE REVISED ORDINANCES OF SAID CITY. RELATING TO THE HEALTH DEPARTMENT.

Be It Ordained By The City Council Of The City Of Highland Park:

SECTION 1. PHYSICIANS TO REPORT.

Every physician who shall prescribe for or attend any person having a contagious or infectious disease such as cholera, yellow fever, scarlet fever, diphtheria, typhus, typhoid fever, small pox, varioloid or any of the grades of such diseases, shall within twenty-four hours after first discovering the existence of such disease, make a report thereof in writing to the sanitary superintendent, which report shall give the name, if known, and the place of dwelling of the person having such disease, together with the character of his or her disease.

SECTION 2. DEATH FROM SUCH DISEASE.

It shall be the duty of each and every physician in the City to report in writing to the sanitary superintendent the death of any of his patients who shall have died in said city, of a contagious disease within twenty-four hours thereafter and to state in such report the specific name and type of such disease.

SECTION 3. HOTEL KEEPER TO REPORT.

Every keeper of any boarding house or lodging house and every inn keeper and hotel keeper shall, within twenty-four hours, report in writing to the sanitary superintendent the facts concerning any person being at any of the aforesaid houses or hotels, and attacked with any contagious disease.

SECTION 4. DUTY OF ALL PERSONS TO REPORT.

It shall be the duty of every person knowing of any individual in said city sick of any contagious disease (where such person shall have reason to regard such individual as neglected or not properly cared for) and to avoid giving said disease to others, and the duty of every physician hearing of any such person who he shall have reason to think requires the attention of the department of health, to at once report the facts to the sanitary superintendent in regard to the disease, condition or dwelling place or position of such sick person.

SECTION 5. HOUSEHOLDER TO REPORT.—CLOTHING ETC., NOT TO BE REMOVED.

Every householder within the limits of the city in whose dwelling there shall occur a case of cholera, yellow

fever, typhoid fever, diphtheria or small pox, shall immediately notify the sanitary superintendent of the same; and until instructions are received from the said officer, no clothing or other property that may have been exposed to infection shall be removed from said house; nor shall any occupant of such dwelling change his residence elsewhere without the consent of the superintendent, during the prevalence of any public danger from said disease; and all physicians or other attendants upon any person sick with small pox, cholera, typhoid or scarlet fever, diphtheria or other disease dangerous to the public health, shall forthwith report the same to the said superintendent.

SECTION 6. REMOVAL OF PERSON.

No person shall, within the city, without a permit from the sanitary superintendent, carry or remove from one building to another, or from any vessel to the shore, any person sick of any contagious or infectious disease. Nor shall any person by any exposure of any individual sick of any contagious or infectious disease of any body of such person, or by any negligent act connected therewith, in respect of the care and custody thereof, or by a needless exposure of himself when sick and not fully recovered, cause or contribute to or promote the spread of disease from any such person or from any dead body.

SECTION 7. INFANTS—NON-EXPOSURE.

No parent, master or custodian of any child or minor, (having power and authority to prevent the same) shall permit any such child or minor to be unnecessarily exposed, or to needlessly expose any other person to the taking or to the infection of any contagious disease.

SECTION 8. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are repealed.

SECTION 9. This ordinance shall be in force from and after its passage, approval and publication as provided by law.

AN ORDINANCE LEVYING A TAX UPON ALL FOREIGN FIRE INSURANCE COMPANIES DOING BUSINESS IN THE CITY OF HIGHLAND PARK.

Be It Ordained By The City Council Of The City Of Highland Park:

SECTION 1. That all corporations, companies or associations not incorporated under the laws of the State of Illinois, and which are engaged in the City of Highland Park, in effecting fire insurance, shall annually pay as a tax to the City Treasurer of the City of Highland Park, for the maintenance, use and benefit of the Fire Department of said City, the sum of two per cent of the annual gross receipts received by said corporation, company or association in said City, said payment to be made as hereinafter provided. Said corporation companies or associations shall pay said rate above specified upon the amount of all premiums which during the year ending on every first day of July, shall have been received from any insurance effected or agreed to be effected in said city, by or with such corporations, companies or associations respectively.

SECTION 2. Every person who shall act in the City of Highland Park as agent or otherwise, for or on behalf of any such corporation company, or association shall on or before the 15th day of July, of each and every year, render to the City of Highland Park, a full, true and just account, verified by his or her oath, of all premiums which, during the year ending on every first day of July preceding such report, shall have been received by him or her, in behalf of any such corporation, company or association, and shall specify in said report the amount received for fire insurance. Such agents shall also pay to the Treasurer of said City of Highland Park, at the time of rendering the aforesaid report, the amount of rate fixed by said ordinance. If such report be not rendered on or before the day herein designated for that purpose, or if the said rate shall remain unpaid after that day, it shall be unlawful for any such corporation, company or association, so in default, to transact any business of insurance in said city until the said requisition shall have been fully complied with; but this provision shall not relieve any such corporation, company or association from the payment of any risk that may be taken in violation hereof.

SECTION 3. Any corporation, company or association or its agent or agents who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be liable to said City of Highland Park in an action to recover the amount of said tax so unpaid to said City, to be brought in the name

of said corporation, company or association, or its agent or agents for the same; and until instructions are received from the said officer, no clothing or other property that may have been exposed to infection shall be removed from said house; nor shall any occupant of such dwelling change his residence elsewhere without the consent of the superintendent, during the prevalence of any public danger from said disease; and all physicians or other attendants upon any person sick with small pox, cholera, typhoid or scarlet fever, diphtheria or other disease dangerous to the public health, shall forthwith report the same to the said superintendent.

SECTION 5. And in addition to the penalties and liabilities herein imposed, any person or persons violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be further subjected to the penalties of fine and imprisonment as imposed by section two of an Act of the General Assembly of the State of Illinois, entitled "An Act to Enable Cities, Towns, and Villages, Organized under any General or Special Law, to Levy a Foreign Fire Insurance Tax and Collect a Tax or License Fee for the Benefit of Organized Fire Departments," in force July 1, 1895, and amendments thereto.

SECTION 6. All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

SECTION 7. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage, approval and publication.

HEINZE TO BE TRIED APRIL 25

Case Charging Misapplication of Bank Funds Is Finally Put on the Calendar.

New York, Mar. 23.—Judge Holt, in the United States circuit court, set the trial of Augustus Heinze on charges of falsification and misapplication of funds of the Mercantile National

MOB AIMS AT AMERICANS

Colombian Rioters Beat Two English Girls, Mistaking Them for Americans.

Bogota, Colombia, Mar. 23.—The anti-American sentiment here continues to find expression in rioting. Two English girls who were mistaken for Americans were mobbed and beaten. Subsequently President Ramon Gonzalez Valencia made an official call upon American Minister Northcott.

Former Gov. Uribe's house was stormed by the rioters. A special decree has been issued placing a transport tax of eight per cent on all American goods leaving the coastal towns for the interior. Joaquin Temper, minister of finance, objected to this move by the government, and, following the issuance of the decree, resigned.

WHERE DID THE MONEY GO?

Cash Paid Out by Insurance Companies Arouses Curiosity of Probers Into Grafting.

New York, Mar. 23.—The big bills paid after year by fire insurance companies under the comprehensive head of legal expenses, with occasional inclusions, again were under examination when Superintendent of Insurance Hotchkiss continued the inquiry he is conducting in connection with legislation at Albany.
