## SEEK PLAY GROUNDS

Highland Park Parents and Teachers Held Meeting Wednesday Night.

The first meeting of the Highland Park Parents, and Teachers' Association was held in the auditorium of the Elm Place Grammar School, Wednesday night Mrs. I. S. Blackwelder of Morgan Park, who for a number of years has been interested in playground associations in Chicago, delivered an address on this subject. The Parents and Teachers Association was organized for the purpose of establishing closer relations between the home and the school and for the physical and intellectual betterment of school children. Members of the association are interested in an athletic committee, which is in charge of the physical welfare of pupils, and it is probable that after Wednesday night's meeting steps will be taken toward establishing more playgrounds.

## Lecture at Waukegan.

Two witty capable Irishmen will give the dry cause a boost in the Armory, Waukegan, Tuesday April 12, at 1:30 and 8:00 p. m. Hon. Michael J. Fanning, one of the prohibition stars of the east, for thirty years a lecturer on the American platform, will hold forth and deliver two lectures. It is asserted that he has delivered more speeches on the liquor question than any other living man in America. Mr. Fanning is highly commended and well thought of in the many states where he has been heard. His lecture at night is entitled, "My Country and Yours."

Capt. Charles H. Stanley of California, who is the traveling companion of Mr. Fanning, is a converted comedian and singing evangelist, who has held meetings in many of the big churches, east and west. He writes all of his own songs and sings the songs he writes. For twenty years, he was on the stage but is now giving the rum traffic all the hard knocks he can. Prohibitionists will hold a county convention in the afternoon, reorganizing for the campaign and electing delegates to the State Convention, May 11 and 12. The County Committee extends a cordial invitation to all citizens to hear Fanning and Stanley.

## CARNEGIE ART JURY MEETS

Ten Well-Known Painters Assemble in Pittsburg to Make Awards of Medals and Prizes.

Pittsburg, Pa., April 7.—Ten eminent painters, comprising the international award prizes for the fourteenth exhibit of canvases in the Carnegie Institute, are in session here today to select the recipients of honors. John W. Beatty, director of fine arts in the institute, is president of the jury. The other members being William H. Chase and Childs Haseman of New York; W. Elmer Schofield of Philadelphia; Charles W. Woodbury of Boston; Leonard Ochtman of Cos Cob, Conn.; Charles H. Davis of Mystic, Conn.; E. W. Redford of Center Ridge, Pa.; W. L.throp of New Hyde, Pa.; Henri Le Sidaner, Oise, France, and Albert Neuhuis, Amsterdam, Holland. The awards to be made are three gold medals and prizes to accompany them of \$1,500, \$1,000 and \$500.

## SEAL CATCH BREAKS RECORD

Total for Season is 300,000, Being the Largest Ever Known on the Labrador Coast.

St. John's, N. F., April 7.—That the fishery this season will be the largest ever known in this colony is asserted by the news received from the sealing steamer Labrador that she has caught 15,000 seals. This will make a total catch for the season of 300,000, breaking all previous records.

## COAL STRIKE TO CONTINUE

Western Pennsylvania Miners and Operators Unable to Agree on Scale and Explosives.

Pittsburg, April 7.—The union miners of western Pennsylvania probably will remain on strike for the next 30 days at least. After a two days conference the wage scale committee of the union men and the operators agreed to adjourn sine die, the miners refusing to carry on further negotiations looking toward any arbitration of the new explosive clause of their contracts. There is but a scant month's supply of coal in the Pittsburgh district and a coal famine is threatened.
