PITTSBURG GRAFT RING LEADERS ESCAPE WITH SUSPENDED SENTENCES.

RUSH FOR PLUNGE STILL ON

Prosecutor Calls Halt and Declares No More Offenders Need Expect Mercy—Barely Quorum Left When Accused Councilmen Resign Seats.

Pittsburg, Pa., Mar. 23.—That the men in high places, as well as the "little fellows," who have been involved as distributors of or sharers in the \$100,000 graft fund now under investigation by the grand jury, will be allowed to escape punishment by means of the "immunity-bath" policy of the prosecutor was the fear expressed by those who are watching the inquiry closely.

Accepting the general proposition of District Attorney Blakeley, a dozen or more of the three-score past or present councilmen implicated by "Capt. Johnny" Klein in bribery deals have appeared before Justice Fraser, confessed their little peccadilloes and received a mild slap in the form of "suspended sentences."

Three more former councilmen appeared and pleaded "no defense" to charges of having received money for their votes in the passage of bank and street vacation ordinances and were given similar "punishment."

Prosecutor Makes Dire Threat. But there is a limit to Prosecutor Blakeley's good nature. With a for-

dingrown he announces that hereafter no offender need expect any mercy.

"Then," he continued, sternly, "councilmen under indictment will be hunted up by the entire staff of county detectives detailed for the work and haled into court without ceremony."

Meanwhile the grand jury is continuing its investigation of the confession of Klein and the corroborating evidence obtained from accused grafters.

That the disclosures of corruption are but started is the prediction of those who profess to know. It is generally believed that Klein's story has not been all told and that its complete telling will still further rip apart city politics and politicians.

May Lack Quorum of Virtuous. An embarrassing situation has developed in the councilmanic bodies through the enforced resignations of a number of the members because of their confessions of guilt, and others are expected to be demanded by reason of indictments found against 40 present and former members by the grand jury.

The councils meet next Monday night, and it is expected by that time that there will not be enough virtuous ones left to form a quorum.

It is considered fortunate in official circles that the budget was passed before the storm broke, as there might have been difficulty in getting special meetings to pass the bills which had to become laws before taxes could be collected.

Aged Man Escapes Death.

Sedalia, Mo., Mar. 23.—Frederick Sangrain, 104 years old, said to be the oldest man in Missouri, had a narrow escape from death when the residence of his son-in-law, John Waddell, burned.

ON HONEYMOON TRIP

ROOSEVELT AND WIFE MAKE JOURNEY ALONE ACROSS COUNTRY.

PIN HOT MEETING PLANNED

Former President is Guest of City on Last Day in Rome—Newspaper Men Respect Privacy of Sentimental Journey.

Spesza, Italy, April 7.—Mr. and Mrs. Roosevelt arrived here this morning and immediately started on a carriage drive over the route to Genoa, which they reversed on their honeymoon. An American newspaper correspondent accompanied Mr. Roosevelt from Khania, near the French frontier, upon request, that they will respect the privacy of this sentimental journey.

Will Pass Three Days at Villa. The carriage drive from Spesza to Genoa, a distance of 65 miles, will occupy the greater part of three days. Arriving at Genoa, the Roosevelts will proceed at once by train to Porto Maurizio, near the French frontier, where they will visit for three days.

Chicago—It is understood and announced that the committee of the railroad managers have refused, in substance, every concession demanded by the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Enginemen, representing 25,000 men on 49 different roads running through the west and southwest. The men had voted by an overwhelming majority to strike.
