## An Ordinance Providing for the Issuance of \$36,000 Bridge Bonds.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HIGHLAND PARK: That there be borrowed on the credit of the City of Highland Park the sum of Thirty-six Thousand Dollars (\$36,000) for the purpose of constructing bridges in and for said City, and that bonds be issued therefor; that such bonds be dated May 1, 1910, bear interest at the rate of Four and One-Half (4 1/2) per centum per annum, payable semi annually numbered from One (1) to Thirty-six (36) inclusive, of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000) each; to mature in the order of their number Four Thousand Dollars (\$4,000) May 1, 1916, Four Thousand Dollars (\$4,000) May 1, 1917, Four Thousand Dollars (\$4,000) May 1, 1918, Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) May 1, 1919, Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) May 1, 1920, Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) May 1, 1921, Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) May 1, 1922, Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) May 1, 1923, Four Thousand Dollars (\$4,000) May 1, 1924, and Four Thousand Dollars (\$4,000) May 1, 1925; and that this ordinance be submitted to the voters of said City at the regular election to be held in said City on Tuesday, April 19th, 1910.

## An Ordinance Providing For The Issuance Of \$4,000 Sewer Bonds

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HIGHLAND PARK: That there be borrowed on the credit of the City of Highland Park the sum of Four Thousand Dollars (\$4,000) for the purpose of improving the sewer system of said City, and that bonds be issued therefor; and that such bonds be dated May 1, 1910, bear interest at the rate of Four and One-Half (4 1/2) Per Centum per annum, payable semi annually, be numbered from One (1) to Four (4) inclusive, of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000) each; to mature in the order of their number, One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000) on May 1, 1919, and One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000) on May 1st of each year thereafter to and including May 1, 1922; and that this ordinance be submitted to the voters of said City at the regular election to be held in said City on Tuesday, April 19th, 1910.

## An Ordinance Providing for the Issuance of \$10,000 Park Bonds.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HIGHLAND PARK: That there be borrowed on the credit of the City of Highland Park the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000) for the purpose of acquiring and improving lands for public parks in and for said City, and that bonds be issued therefor; that such bonds be dated May 1, 1910, bear interest at the rate of Four and One-Half (4 1/2) Per Centum per annum, payable semi annually, be numbered from One (1) to Ten (10) inclusive, of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000) each; to mature One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000) on May 1, 1916, and one Thousand Dollars (\$1,000) on May 1st of each year thereafter up to and including May 1, 1925; and that this ordinance be submitted to the voters of said City at the regular election to be held in said City on Tuesday, April 19th, 1910.

## To the Voters of Highland Park.

At the coming City Election to be held on April 19th, there will be submitted for approval or rejection three ordinances for the issuing of bonds; and while by this time most of the citizens are fully acquainted with the proposition, and notice of the election as well as of the voting on the proposition, there may be some of our citizens who do not fully realize that this bond money is to be used, and in order that each voter may be enabled to intelligently cast his ballot, the Mayor and City Council have authorized the City Clerk to send out the following statement:

The Park Bonds are to be used for the purchasing of a site for a City Park and Play Grounds located in the west part of our town.

The Bridge Bonds are to be used for the repairing of our bridges and the erection of several new concrete ones. As matters are now, it costs the city thousands of dollars each year to keep the old wooden bridges in repair, and in order to stop this expenditure of money which is much needed for the maintenance of our highways and other purposes, concrete structures are intended to replace every bridge now dangerous to traffic, and the only way to raise the funds for this purpose is through a bond issue.

The Sewer Bonds are for the installing of a septic tank at the foot of Ravine Drive for the purpose of purifying the sewerage entering the lake at this point. The sewer system (the only one in our City not connected with a septic tank) does not only take care of the sewage of the east but also of a large part of the west end of our city.

It is for the above stated reasons, and after a careful consideration, that the City Council has decided to pass the ordinances for the Bond Issues and now submit them to the Citizens of Highland Park.
