At the villa of Miss Carow, Mrs. Tipple's sister. Mr. Roosevelt has announced that he will receive no one at Porto Maurizio except Gifford Pinchot, former chief forester of the United States department of agriculture.

Last Day in Rome Busy.
Mr. Roosevelt's last day in Rome was as busy as were the two preceding days. After devoting two hours to his mail and telegrams he left his hotel at ten o'clock for a call on Prof. Giacomo Boni, the archaeologist. At 12 o'clock he received a visit from Baron Fava, former Italian ambassador at Washington.

Guglielmo Ferrero, the historian, entertained Mr. Roosevelt and a few other friends at luncheon. At the same time Mrs. Roosevelt was a luncheon guest of Mrs. Leshman, wife of the American ambassador. There were 20 women in the party. Later Mr. Roosevelt went to the embassy and met Mr. Leshman's guests and other American and Italian friends who had called there.

At 5:30 p. m. Mr. and Mrs. Roosevelt, Miss Ethel and Kermit attended a tea given in their honor at the Capitoline museum. The tea preceded a dinner tendered to Mr. Roosevelt by the municipality of Rome.

Kermit Roosevelt and Miss Ethel will remain in Rome until Saturday, when they will go directly to Porto Maurizio to join their parents.

Francis Joseph to Be Host April 18. Vienna, Austria, April 7.—Emperor Francis Joseph's state dinner at Schonbrunn in honor of Mr. Roosevelt will be given April 18. The preceding evening Count von Ashrenthal, foreign minister, will entertain the former president at an official dinner at the foreign office.

Bloodhounds and Posse Chase Condemned Man in Virginia Woods After He Escapes Jail.

Norfolk, Va., April 7.—Thomas Noel, condemned negro, who escaped from the Norfolk county jail March 30, was fatally shot in Drummond's woods on the outskirts of Norfolk after being chased 24 hours by a posse with bloodhounds. He is dying. The murder of Deputy Sheriff Sykes is the crime charged to him.
