4th. Party Service.

As long as we have government party we will be in danger of partisan government, and party orators will be likely to test the efficiency of an administration by its ability to carry out its campaign promises, find fault with its supporters, or give legislation to enhance the power of the party represented. But any administration that is by partisan is by so much corrupt and inefficient.

When we have said all this in what does not constitute administrative efficiency, we find ourselves drawn to the side of the World's Emancipator by Him who made service the character—by Him who said "the fruits ye shall know them". If we have an adequate and universal applicable to the administration of office as of private position.
