Let us not overlook the promise that has been made by the officials of the Chicago and Northwestern Railway Co., to construct a new and wider subway at Laurel avenue sufficient to handle the traffic at that point.

We should also appeal to the company to consider the condition surrounding their freight depot and see if we can not pursuade the company to remedy that situation.

And finally let us all put our shoulder, to the wheel and work together in unison and harmony for all that goes to make Highland Park a place of rest and refinement and of quiet, contented homes. Respectfully submitted,


