HIGHLAND PARK CITY CLUB

A public meeting of the club of great interest was held on Friday evening, June 11th, at the public library. Mr. F. S. Munro, the vice president, presided in the absence of the president, and the meeting was addressed by Mr. George E. Cole, formerly president of the Municipal Voters League of Chicago and by Mr. George Sykes of the Chicago City Club. Mr. Cole spoke on the importance of primary elections for the State Legislature, and at his suggestion, a motion was adopted by the meeting directing the president to appoint three delegates of the club to the Legislature in Voters League Convention at Peoria, Illinois, at the end of the month. Mr. Sykes spoke on Municipal Administration: The action of the Board of Governors submitting draft of ordinance for Saner Fourth of July to the Council, and petitioning the Council to publish its proceedings, reports, and warrants issued for bills, together with the request to take steps to bury the overhead wires, was approved by the club.

BIG REAL ESTATE DEAL

The biggest deal of the year in North Shore acres has been closed in the sale by Murray & Terry, for Wm. H. Johnson to Charles F. Fishback of Porter, Fishback & Co., bankers, Chicago, of a tract of 153 acres west of Green Bay Road in our city, adjoining on the south the handsome country place of 45 acres recently purchased by Curtis N. Kimball of the Kimball company. The consideration is withheld, but it is said the property is valued at from \$1,200 to \$1,500 an acre, which would make the price paid from \$190,000 to \$200,000.

The property, which is largely on the ridge overlooking the Skokie, will be divided into plots of from 10 to 100 acres for high class country homes and will be placed upon the market.

North Shore Women Met in Our City to Arrange Details for Summer Encampment

North Shore society women who are interested in the Gads Hill Encampment near Lake Bluff met yesterday for luncheon at the Moraine Hotel and planned the work for the summer. Chairman and representatives of all the towns interested, from Evanston to Waukegan, were present.

It was decided to give a number of small entertainments for the benefit of the camp, during the summer, one at each town, and a large affair of some kind toward the end of the season, probably the last of August or first of September.

All the towns will be interested in the large closing entertainment, the nature of which will be decided upon later. Fifty-seven women were present at the meeting and luncheon yesterday. Mrs. Frank R. McMullin of this city is general chairman, Mrs. William Pope is chairman from Waukegan; Mrs. A. A. Carpenter, Jr., Lake Forest; Mrs. Frederick V. Steele, Highland Park; Mrs. J. W. Scott, Winnetka and Hubbard Woods; Mrs. L. M. Russell, Kenilworth; Mrs. Thomas H. Lamprecht, Glenoee; Mrs. Walter, Evanston.

A number of new buildings are being added to the encampment. Among them are an assembly hall which is given by Mrs. Robert B. Gregory; a library, the gift of Mrs. MacGregor Adams, and cooperative dining-room by Mrs. A. A. Carpenter, Jr.

RAVINIA

At a meeting of the Ravinia Improvement Association held at the Ravinia school house last Monday evening (the 13th inst.) a resolution was unanimously adopted that a committee be appointed to look into the question of purchasing additional ground for the school house at Ravinia. Those present were of the opinion that in a few years, when Ravinia builds up, the present quarters will be found to be inadequate. Speeches were made in which attention was called to the lack of consideration shown the Ravinia school, and those present were urged to take a more active interest in such matters.

A committee was also appointed to look into the question of better facilities near the Ravinia station. This is one of the most dangerous points along the North Shore, as there is less space between the Milwaukee Electric tracks and the Chicago & Northwestern tracks at Ravinia than almost anywhere else. Many of the people in Ravinia feel that a mistake has been made in allowing the railroad company to run in its cars at full speed across Roger Williams avenue.

Mr. W. R. Boerner, Treasurer of the Association, reported that \$302 had been subscribed by the members last year for the purpose of cleaning up and otherwise improving the grounds near the depot. This work has been pushed during the last three weeks and a very great change for the better is noticeable. The Association is now trying to raise the grounds in order this summer and anticipates little difficulty in doing so.
