Physicians to report-SECTION 1. ery physician who shall prescribe for attend any person having a contagious infectious disease such as cholera, low fever, scarlet fever, diphtheria, shus, typhoid fever, small pox, variloid any of the grades of such diseases, all within twenty-four hours after first covering the existence of such disease, ike a report thereof in writing to the nitary superintendent, which report all give the name, if known, and place of dwelling of the person having th disease, together with the character his or her disease. Said physician shall ther report in writing to said superintdent, when, in his opinion, the patient s passed the contagious period, so that d premises can be properly fumigated. SECTION 2. Death from such disease. shall be the duty of each and every ysician in the City to report in iting to the sanitary superintendent . It e death of any of his patients who shall h ve died in said city, of a contagious sease within twenty four hours thereter and to state in such report the ecific name and type of such disease. SECTION 3. Hotel keeper to report. very keeper of any boarding house or dging Louse and every inn keeper and tel keeper shall, within twenty-four urs, report in writing to the sanitary it perintendent the facts concerning any p rson being at any of the aforesaid tels, and attacked with any houses or ntagious disease.

SECTION 4. Duty of all persons to rert. It shall be the duty of every perch knowing of any individual in said city the of any contagious diseases (where tch person shall have reason to regard such individual as neglected or not ery physician hearing of such person to he shall have reason to think reires the attention of the department of alth, to at once report the facts to the a nitary superintendent in regard to the sease, condition or dwelling place or sition of such sick person.

SECTION 5. Householder to reportothing etc. Not to be removed. Every useholder within the limits of the city whose dwelling there shall occur a case cholera, yellow fever, typhoid fever. carlet fever, diphtheria or smallpox, all immediately notify the sanitary perintendent of the same; and untistructions are received from the said icer, no clothing or other property that by have been exposed to infection shall removed from said house; nor shall ever, diphtheria or other disease danrous to the public health, shall forthth report the same to the said superin-

ECTION 6. Removal of person: No rson shall, within the city, without a rmit from the sanitary superintendent, rry or remove from one building to anher, or from any vessel to the shore, y person sick of any contagious or inctious disease. Nor shall any person any exposure of any individual sick any contagious or infectious disease of y body of such person, or by any negent act connected therewith, or in reect of the care and custody thereof, or a needless exposure of himself when k and not fully recovered, cause or ntribute to or promote the spread of sease from any such person or from y dead body.
