

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HIGHLAND PARK.

Section 1. That a special election be and is hereby called to be held in and for said city on Tuesday the 28th day of June 1910, for the purpose of submitting to the voters of such city, for their approval, each of three ordinances this day passed by this City Council, providing for the borrowing of money and the issuance of bonds in the amount of thirty-six thousand dollars (\$36,000) for constructing bridges in and for said city; for the borrowing of money and the issuance of bonds in the amount of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) for acquiring and improving lands for public parks in said city; and for the borrowing of money and the issuance of bonds in the amount of four thousand dollars (\$4,000) for improving the sewer system of said city; respectively.

Section 2. That each of the wards of said city be and they are hereby respectively declared and created election districts or precincts; that the voting place in and for the first ward be at the Fire Department Building, Central Avenue and Green Bay Road; that the voting place in and for the second ward be at the store of H. M. Prior, on Sheridan Road; that the voting place in and for the third ward be at the store of D. C. Purdy and Sons on St. Johns Avenue; and that the voting place in and for the fourth ward be at the store of Brand Brothers, Central Avenue and Second Street.

Section 3. That the following named voters be and they are hereby respectively appointed and created judges and clerks of and for said election.

First Ward—Judges, D. P. Sheahan, Paul Gieser, M. Mosses, Clerks,—Thomas Rogan T. H. Decker, A. Gieser.

Second Ward—Judges—R. E. Winter, F. J. Gallagher, W. E. Brand, Clerks—Howard Mowers, Henry Bell, J. N. Finney.

Third Ward—Judges W. M. Goodridge, D. C. Purdy, R. W. Patton. Clerks—L. G. Yeo, Chas. Everett, J. C. Shields.

Fourth Ward—Judges—R. G. Evans, S. Levin, Aug. Benson.—Clerks—Harbert Inman, Edward Larson, Geo. L. Brand.

Section 4. That at said election the polls be opened at 7 o'clock in the morning and be closed at 5 o'clock in the afternoon of said 28th day of June 1910.

Section 5. That the said Clerk of the City of Highland Park be and he is hereby directed to cause notice of said election to be published in the North Shore News-Letter, a weekly news paper printed and published in this city, for not less than twenty days prior to said election, by inserting in said news-paper the notice hereinafter set out in each and every issue, thereof from the date of first insertion to said election, and by posting copies of the notices hereinafter set out at each of the voting places in said city, as hereinbefore designated, at least twenty days prior to said election.

Section 6. That the notices herein directed to be published and posted be as follows.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HIGHLAND PARK: That there be borrowed on the credit of the City of Highland Park, the sum of thirty-six thousand dollars (\$36,000) for the purpose of constructing bridges in and for said city, and that bonds be issued therefor; that such bonds be dated June 1, 1910, bear interest at the rate of four and one-half (4½) per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, be numbered from one (1) to thirty-six (36) both numbers included, of one thousand dollars (\$1000) each, to mature in the order of their number, four thousand dollars (\$4000) June 1, 1916, four thousand (\$4000) June 1, 1917, four thousand dollars (\$4000) June 1, 1918, three thousand dollars (\$3000) June 1, 1919, three thousand dollars (\$3000) June 1, 1920, three thousand dollars (\$3000) June 1, 1921, three thousand dollars (\$3000) June 1, 1922, four thousand dollars (\$4000) June 1, 1923, four thousand dollars (\$4000) June 1, 1924, and four thousand dollars (\$4000) June 1, 1925; that there shall be and there is hereby levied and there shall be collected upon the taxable property in the city of Highland Park a direct annual tax for each of the years 1910 to 1924 both included, sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds as it falls due and also to pay and discharge the principal thereof at maturity; and that this ordinance be submitted to the voters of said city at a special election to be held in said city for that purpose on Tuesday the 28th day of June 1910.

An Ordinance Providing for the Issuance of \$10,000 Park Bonds.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HIGHLAND PARK: That there be borrowed on the credit of the City of Highland Park the sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) for the purpose of acquiring and improving lands for public parks in and for said city, and that bonds be issued therefor, that such bonds shall be dated June 1, 1910 bear interest at the rate of four and one-half (4½) per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, numbered from one (1) to ten (10) both numbers included, of one thousand dollars (\$1000) each, to mature in the order of their number, one thousand dollars (\$1000) on June 1, 1916, and one thousand dollars (\$1000) on June 1, of each year thereafter up to and including June 1, 1925; that there shall be and there is hereby levied and there shall be collected upon the taxable property in the City of Highland Park a direct annual tax for each of the years 1910 to 1924 both included, sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds as it falls due and also to pay and discharge the principal thereof at maturity; and that this ordinance be submitted to the voters of said City at a special election to be held in said city for that purpose on Tuesday the 28th day of June, 1910.

An Ordinance Providing For The Issuance Of \$4,000 Sewer Bonds.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HIGHLAND PARK:—That there be borrowed on the credit of the City of Highland Park the sum of four thousand dollars (\$4000) for the purpose of improving the sewer system of said city, and that bonds be issued therefor; that such bonds be dated June 1, 1910, bear interest at the rate of four and one-half (4½) per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, be numbered from one (1) to four (4) both numbers included, of one thousand dollars (\$1000) each, to mature in the order of their number, one thousand dollars (\$1000) June 1, 1919, and one thousand dollars (\$1000) on June 1, of each year thereafter up to and including June 1, 1922; that there shall be and there is hereby levied and there shall be collected upon the taxable property and in the City of Highland Park a direct annual tax for each of the years 1910 to 1921, both included, sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds as it falls due and also to pay and discharge the principal thereof at maturity; and that this ordinance be submitted to the voters of said city at a special election to be held in said city for that purpose on Tuesday the 28th day of June 1910.

LEGAL

ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF HIGHLAND PARK AMENDING CHAPTERS XVI OF THE REVISED ORDINANCES OF SAID CITY, RELATING TO THE HEALTH DEPARTMENT.

It ordained by the city council of the city of Highland Park:

SECTION 1. Physicians to report—Every physician who shall prescribe for or attend any person having a contagious or infectious disease such as cholera, yellow fever, scarlet fever, diphtheria, typhus, typhoid fever, small pox, varioloid or any of the grades of such diseases, shall within twenty-four hours after first discovering the existence of such disease, make a report thereof in writing to the sanitary superintendent, which report shall give the name, if known, and the place of dwelling of the person having such disease, together with the character of his or her disease. Said physician shall further report in writing to said superintendent, when, in his opinion, the patient has passed the contagious period, so that the premises can be properly fumigated.

SECTION 2. Death from such disease.—It shall be the duty of each and every physician in the City to report in writing to the sanitary superintendent the death of any of his patients who shall have died in said city, of a contagious disease within twenty-four hours thereafter and to state in such report the specific name and type of such disease.

SECTION 3. Hotel keeper to report.—Every keeper of any boarding house or lodging house and every inn keeper and hotel keeper shall, within twenty-four hours, report in writing to the sanitary superintendent the facts concerning any person being at any of the aforesaid hotels, and attacked with any contagious disease.

SECTION 4. Duty of all persons to report.—It shall be the duty of every person knowing of any individual in said city of any contagious diseases (where such person shall have reason to regard such individual as neglected or not properly cared for) and to avoid giving aid or assistance to others, and the duty of every physician hearing of such person who he shall have reason to think requires the attention of the department of health, to at once report the facts to the sanitary superintendent in regard to the disease, condition or dwelling place or position of such sick person.

SECTION 5. Householder to report.—Nothing etc. Not to be removed. Every householder within the limits of the city in whose dwelling there shall occur a case of cholera, yellow fever, typhoid fever, scarlet fever, diphtheria or smallpox, shall immediately notify the sanitary superintendent of the same; and until instructions are received from the said officer, no clothing or other property that may have been exposed to infection shall be removed from said house; nor shall any occupant of such dwelling change his residence elsewhere without the consent of the superintendent, during the prevalence of any public danger from said disease; and all physicians or other attendants upon any person sick with small pox, cholera, typhoid or scarlet fever, diphtheria or other disease dangerous to the public health, shall forthwith report the same to the said superintendent.

SECTION 6. Removal of person: No person shall, within the city, without a permit from the sanitary superintendent, carry or remove from one building to another, or from any vessel to the shore, any person sick of any contagious or infectious disease. Nor shall any person expose any individual sick with any contagious or infectious disease of any body of such person, or by any neglect act connected therewith, or in respect of the care and custody thereof, or a needless exposure of himself when sick and not fully recovered, cause or contribute to or promote the spread of disease from any such person or from any dead body.

SECTION 7. Infants—Non-exposure.—No parent, master or custodian of any child or minor, (having power and authority to prevent the same) shall permit any such child or minor to be unnecessarily exposed, or to needlessly expose any other person to the taking of the infection of any contagious disease.

SECTION 8. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

SECTION 9. This ordinance shall be in force from and after its passage, approval and publication as provided by law.
