BOARD OF TRUSTEES.

The Board of Trustees of the Village of Glencoe met this date pursuant to adjournment.

Minutes of meeting June 7th read and approved. A remonstrance of John C. Wilken and others against the proposition to vacate the alley in Block 4 was presented and read.

A letter from Frank Hibbard of Chicago was presented complaining of the condition of North Sheridan Road and North Green Bay Road.

Letters from Mr. O. R. Barnett relative to an adjustment on the books of the Village Treasurer of the account of the Library Fund were presented and referred to Chairman Goss.

An order was made, on motion of Mr. Styles, designating the chairman of the Judiciary and Corporations Committee to give pole permits in future to the Chicago Telephone Company.

AN ORDINANCE LEVYING A TAX UPON ALL FOREIGN FIRE INSURANCE COMPANIES DOING BUSINESS IN THE CITY OF HIGHLAND PARK.

Be it Ordained by the City Council of the City of Highland Park:

SECTION 1. That all corporations, companies or associations not incorporated under the laws of the State of Illinois, and which are engaged in the City of Highland Park, in effecting fire insurance, shall annually pay as a tax to the City Treasurer of the City of Highland Park for the maintenance, use and benefit of the Fire Department of said City, the sum of two per cent of the annual gross receipts received by said corporation, company or association in said City, said payments to be made as hereinafter provided. Said corporations, companies or associations shall pay said rate above specified upon the amount of all premiums which during the year ending on every first day of July, shall have been received from any insurance effected or agreed to be effected in said city, by or with such corporations, companies or associations respectively.

SECTION 2. Every person who shall act in the City of Highland Park as agent or otherwise, for or on behalf of any such corporation company or association, shall on or before the 15th day of July, of each and every year, render to the City of Highland Park, a full, true and just account, verified by his or her oath, of all premiums which, during the year ending on every first day of July preceding such report, shall have been received by him or her, or any other person for him or her in behalf of any such corporation, company or association, and shall specify in said report the amount received for fire insurance. Such agents shall also pay to the Treasurer of said City of Highland Park, at the time of rendering the aforesaid report, the amount of rate fixed by said ordinance. If such report be not rendered on or before the day herein designated for that purpose, or if the said rate shall remain unpaid after that day, it shall be unlawful for any such corporation, company or association, so in default, to transact any business of insurance in said city until the said requisition shall have been fully complied with; but this provision shall not relieve any such corporation, company or association from the payment of any risk that may be taken in violation hereof.

SECTION 3. Any corporation, company or association or its agent or agents who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be liable to said City of Highland Park in an action to recover the amount of said tax so unpaid to said City, to be brought in the name of said city, against said corporation, company or association, or its agent or agents for money had and received.

SECTION 4. Any corporation, company or association or its agent or agents, who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance, shall forfeit and pay to said City of Highland Park the sum of twenty-five dollars upon conviction, for each and every offense.

SECTION 5. And in addition to the penalties and liabilities herein imposed any person or persons violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be further subject to the penalties of fine and imprisonment as imposed by section two of an act of the General Assembly of the State of Illinois, entitled "An Act to Enable Cities, Towns and Villages, organized under any General or Special Law, to Levy and Collect a Tax or License Fee from Foreign Fire Insurance Companies for the benefit of Organized Fire Departments, orce July 1, 1898, and the amendments hereto.

SECTION 6. All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

SECTION 7. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage, approval and publication. Passed March 1, 1910 Approved March 8, 1910.
