### MEXICAN LINES BRANCH OUT

National Railways to Acquire the Pan-American and Other Roads in Republic.

Mexico City, June 15.—That there is good authority for believing that the National Railways of Mexico will soon acquire the Pan-American railroad recently bought by D. E. Thompson, former United States ambassador to Mexico; the Vera Cruz & Isthmus system, and the Tehuantepec National railroad, is the statement made by the Mexican Herald.

### MONTREAL FIRE DEATHS 29

Three Bodies Are Recovered From the Ruins of the Herald Newspaper Building.

Montreal, June 15.—A search of the ruins of the Herald building, which was destroyed by fire, brought to light out one additional victim, making in all three bodies recovered. Relays of police and firemen are digging at the ruins believed to contain the bodies of 26 additional victims. A wild crowd began to besiege the city morgues, searching for missing relatives and friends. Reports from the hospitals indicate that the 25 injured are doing well.

Decatur.—With one exception all of the old officers and directors of the Illinois Grain Dealers' association were reelected at the close of the seventeenth annual convention. George W. Cole of Bushnell is the newly elected director. The principal resolutions adopted favored revision of the national trade rules and the discontinuance of the double-weight system in St. Louis. Resolutions of sympathy to L. Y. Sherman, the death of whose wife prevented him from addressing the convention.

Chicago.—While the disabled engine of their 20-foot gasolin launch Venus gave them no aid, E. Lundquist, 3343 Osgood street, and C. A. Rasmussen, 3710 Armitage avenue, battled with a high sea on Lake Michigan for three hours. They finally were rescued by two Lincoln park policemen, who heard their cries for help as the waves carried the disabled launch about twenty-five feet from shore at the jackknife bridge in Lincoln park.

Assumption.—After the decision of County Judge Prater in the election contest making this township "wet," the city council met to draft a saloon ordinance. The city board consists of three "drys" and three "wets" with a "dry" mayor, but the vote was unanimous for saloon license at \$800 per year. The board will meet again for the consideration of applicants for saloon license.

East St. Louis.—Rain dampened everything on the East side except the spirits of the Egyptian Hustlers here in convention. It is expected 25,000 visitors will come to East St. Louis during the week.

An Ordinance Providing For The Issuance Of \$36,000 Bridge Bonds.—That BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HIGHLAND PARK, the sum of thirty-six thousand dollars there be borrowed on the credit of the City of Highland Park, and for said city, and that bonds be issued therefor for the purpose of constructing bridges in and for said city, and that bonds be issued therefor; that such bonds be dated June 1, 1910, bear interest at the rate of four and one-half (4 1/2) per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, be numbered from one (1) to thirty-six (36) both numbers included, in the order of their number, four thousand dollars each, to mature on June 1, 1917, four thousand dollars (\$4000) June 1, 1918, three thousand dollars (\$3000) June 1, 1919, three thousand dollars (\$3000) June 1, 1920, three thousand dollars (\$3000) June 1, 1921, three thousand dollars (\$3000) June 1, 1922, four thousand dollars (\$4000) June 1, 1923, four thousand dollars (\$4000) June 1, 1924, and four thousand dollars (\$4000) June 1, 1925; that there shall be and there is hereby levied and there shall be collected upon the taxable property in the city of Highland Park a direct annual tax for each of the years 1910 to 1924 both included, sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds as it falls due and also to pay and discharge the principal thereof at maturity; and that this ordinance be submitted to the voters of said city at a special election to be held in said city for that purpose on Tuesday the 28th day of June 1910.
