Quincy.-Adams county, of which Quincy is the metropolis and the county seat, has suffered the first cruel disappointment of the census 1910. The census bureau gave the first figures on the decennia enumeration and included therein wa the announcement that Adams county now has a population of 64,577, loss of 2,500 from the count of 1900. The Illinois law provides that any county with a population exceeding 70,000 is entitled to a probate court. In 1900 the population of Adams county was 67,058. The announcement leaves the county 4,500 shy of the necessary number. McLean county also is wondering whether the new census will give it a probate court. 230 N.
