distinguished themselves by grading in gowns the materials of which only a dollar each. Among their smates were some whose gowns from \$50 upward, but it was said the dollar gowns looked every bit as dainty as their more luxurious ones, and could not be distinguished from the committee delegated to discriminate between them. This incident is only one of many that indicate a radical reform in the matter of commencement costumes for girls. The elegance and elaboration of these gowns during recent years were alarming thoughtful observers; but in many of our High Schools earnings have been issued on the subject while at Wellesley, Bryn Mawr, Mount Holyoke and other colleges, stringent rules were made this year concerning the cost of graduating gowns. At Bryn Mawr, the specifications were most minute, the very height of each collar and character of each tie being indicated. This movement for economy among our girls is an encouraging sign of the times.

HOW THE INITIATIVE WORKS.

Oregon Has Obtained Many Satisfactory Results from It.

In answer to the question what Oregon has accomplished through the initiative or referendum, William S. U'Ren, an Oregon member of the National Municipal League, has set forth the various results. Briefly, these are:

A satisfactory direct primary nominating election law; the method of electing United States senators by the legislature as designated by the people; political machine wrecked and the job of party boss abolished; railroad passes abolished; sale of franchises stopped in Portland and other cities; home rule in charter making for cities; legislature stopped from loading down the general appropriation bill with special appropriations; adoption of the recall, giving to the people the power to dismiss state and local officers who are incompetent or not trustworthy; constitutional restriction removed to prevent proportional representation and election by a majority instead of a plurality vote; laws passed after their rejection by a legislature for taxing certain corporations; rejection of some unpopular appropriations made by the legislature; passage of a law against the excessive use of money in elections, the law designed to put the poor man on a footing with the rich man in seeking office and limits candidates to an expenditure not exceeding one-fourth of the salary of the office; development of a sense of individual responsibility for the success of self-government.

Washington and other western states are working for similar legislation.

Municipal League of Kentucky

One of the latest members of the National Municipal League is the Municipal League of Kentucky. In its preamble the league, which was recently organized, sets forth that its object is "the interest and welfare of the municipalities of Kentucky, the promotion of beneficial legislation, the promotion of means to obtain wise and economic administration, and to advance the interests of the citizens of all cities and towns of the state." James H. Polsgrove is the president of the league.

Water Power: Only Hope for Cheap Living.

We actually mine and ship each year about five hundred million tons of coal. So the water power, the bulk of which we are giving over to monopoly, represents more than the equivalent of all our coal; represents the only hope for cheap living; represents a fuel or source of power which while controlled by the people can be used for public income and for regulating costs; but which when alienated as we are alienating it, will create a trust that will make of the meat trust a pigmy and that by simply adding pennies to its charges for power will reduce us to a slavery which would make the Standard Oil Magnates gasp with envy. Such a state of affairs would surely produce a revolution. Only sane and radical action can avoid such a contingency. —John L. Mahews in *Hampden* Magazine.
