GENERAL NEWS

Fairfax Harrison, vice-president of the Southern Railroad company, was elected president of the Chicago, Indianapolis & Louisville (Monon) railway, to succeed the late Ira G. Rawn. High tariff schedules, trusts and an increased money supply, are held accountable for the increased cost of living by Senators Johnston of Alabama, Clarke of Arkansas and Smith of South Carolina, whose minority report as members of a United States senate investigating committee has been made public.

Mayor M. T. Chipstead of Blakely, Ga., was shot while in bed at his home. He struggled with his assailant, who fled, leaving him severely wounded.

Without using the "short and ugly word" Senator Bristow of Kansas passed the direct lie to Senator Aldrich at Milwaukee when, in a speech in behalf of the candidacy of Senator La Follette for renomination, he answered Senator Aldrich's reply to the former charges of the Kansas that Aldrich juggled the tariff on rubber to further his own financial interests.

In rioting at Columbus, O., six street-car men were injured, one, Henry Dick, a motorman, being shot in the leg. The others were hit by flying stones and bricks.

Denouncing efforts of interested persons to influence jurymen in the second trial of Lee O'Neil Browne on the charge of bribing legislators to vote for Senator Lorimer, as a travesty on justice, Judge Kersten excused an entire panel of veniremen at Chicago until an investigation could be made.

Elton Lower, president of Chicago's civil service commission, has been selected by President Taft at Beverly, Mass., to study departmental organization of federal administration with a view to recommending time and money saving reforms.

TAMENESS OF A SEA LION Old Ben, Weighing Half a Ton, is Often Met on the Streets of Avalon.

In describing the islands lying off the southern coast of California Frederick Holder writes: "The feature which will really amaze the wanderer among the Channel Islands is the tameness of some animals. To meet a bull sea lion weighing approximately half a ton on the main avenue of a town, 50 feet from the water, is a possibility of a startling nature, yet I have seen Old Ben, the head of the Santa Catalina sea lion rookery, on Crescent avenue, Avalon, surrounded by tourists who snapped their cameras at him with impunity.
