

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

Alfred Villa reached Tucson, Ariz., after driving forty miles with the dead body of his brother, who had been killed by lightning. The surviving boy was paralyzed and could use only one hand.

Robert Treat Paine, president of the American Peace society and widely known as a philanthropist, died at his home in Waltham, Mass. He was a sufferer from paralysis.

An excursion train from Bordeaux, with 1,200 passengers and running at a speed of 50 miles an nour, crashed into a freight train at Saujon, France. Thirty-two persons were killed and 100 injured. Many of the victims were school girls. A misplaced switch caused the accident.

Rioting was resumed in Columbus, O., and one man was fatally shot and five others injured. So fierce was the violence of the crowds that all street car traffic was abandoned.
