and telegraph companies, does in terms include express companies as railroads or common carriers. The act, however, is probably defective in not going further and making specific requirements adapted peculiarly to express companies. He also added some explanation touching amendatory legislation in preparation in the Committee.

It seems to us the railroad companies are the responsible common carriers upon whom the regulation of rates for every thing carried on their rails should fall. If it be held admissible for them to sublet their facilities they should still be held responsible for the lessees, to whom they turn over their transportation facilities held under public franchises. If they were thus regulated by the States and likewise by a commission under authority of Congress, then the people of the United States would come into their own and get decent treatment. Such regulation is due all over the country; and it ought not to be possible for the lobbyists at Washington, in or out of Senate or House, as in times past, to defeat legislation to this end.

## Highland Park Items

### THE ELM PLACE SCHOOL

The Elm Place School of Highland Park and the "Annex" will re-open for the school year, Tuesday morning, Sept. 6th. It is announced that the usual regulation with reference to the enrollment of children under school age will be in force, namely that children under six years of age whose sixth birthday will occur not later than November 1 may enroll with the entering September class. Others nearly of school age but not coming under the above classification will be required to wait until the organization of another class for beginners in February next. It is important that all children entitled to enter the beginner's class be enrolled during the month of September, since it is not feasible to organize another such class until February. Since there has been a number of cases of whooping cough in Highland Park during the summer special efforts will be made to prevent the enrollment of any child likely to bring contagion into the school. No child from a home where there is a case of whooping cough will be admitted to the school unless it brings a certificate showing that it has already had the disease. All children having had the disease during the past few weeks will be required to bring a physician's certificate to secure admission to the school. All but four of the teaching staff of last year are to return to their positions for another year. Miss Edna Hudson will teach Latin in the high school at Ishpeming, Michigan; Miss Bessie Donaldson is to be principal of a school in Minnesota; Miss Ellen Wohlgenuth is to teach in her home town of Pason, Kansas. Miss Floy Robertson was married on August 14 to Mr. Guy L. Longlade and will be at home after Oct. 1 at Connersville, Indiana. The new members of the staff are Miss William S. Parks of Evanston, formerly of the Fairmount, W. Va., schools; Miss Edna Toland of the Logansport, Ind., schools; Miss M. Lucille Van Law of the Mendota, Ill., schools; and Miss Etta Grunewald of Rockford, who has for several years been principal of the high school at Rock Falls, Illinois.

The Elm Place building has been in the hands of painters, wood workers, and cleaners in general for several weeks and is now in most attractive condition for school work. Mr. Fred Glader has been appointed engineer and Mrs. Emily S. Johnson is janitress in charge both at the Elm Place School and the "Annex."
