ILLINOIS EXPRESS RATES.

The state railroad and warehouse commission intends to order the express companies to cut their rates on local business 10 per cent on Oct. 1. The order should be obeyed without demur. The rates are excessive, as everybody who has had to do business with the companies knows. They have been the theme of bitter and incessant complaint, especially since the last raise. After a long inquiry the commission has been fully convinced of the justice of the complaint. The reduction ordered is an extremely moderate one. The companies will not obey. They will take the ground that the legislature never has specifically authorized the commission to regulate their rates, and that therefore it has no authority in the premises. So the order of the commission will mean a lawsuit. The Supreme court of Illinois and perhaps of the United States will have to sit in judgement on the matter. While lawyers are arguing and judges are meditating the luckless shippers will continue to be shorn. Wretched is the man who can only get his rights at the end of a lawsuit. But the legislature can cut the ground from under the feet of the express companies. It can early next year, give the railroad and warehouse commission specific authority to regulate express rates. Then the companies would come down forthwith, for they know they cannot defend in court the reasonableness of their charges. Previous legislatures have been asked to give this authority, but have refused. Probably the express companies know why. They are not unacquainted with the dark and devious ways of Illinois legislation.

If the next general assembly be an honest one, shippers will get relief much sooner than they can under the order the commission is to issue, even though it finally be upheld by the courts. The order is all right. The complaint one can make is that it was not made a year ago. But the general assembly has a duty to perform.

NEWS NUGGETS FROM ILLINOIS

Chicago.—Two little girls, clinging to each other in a swaying buggy, behind a fear-crazed horse and shrieking with fright, were saved from being plunged to death in the Chicago river at Ashland avenue by the prompt action of two men. The two children were saved, but the rescued and rescuers were thrown into a ditch at the side of the street, and all were severely bruised. Edna Walsh, fifteen years old, and her sister May, twelve years old, were driving their father's horse and buggy along Ashland avenue when the animal took fright and started to run in the direction of the river. Edna, who was driving, tugged bravely at the lines, but could not check the frightened horse.
Waukegan.—A deal is under way for a traffic agreement which will make possible the operation of the longest electric railway running out of Chicago. In Milwaukee the Chicago & Milwaukee Northern line, which extends to Sheboygan. The combined lines will be 150 miles long.
Leland.—The safe in the postoffice here was blown open. The robbers got \$75 in stamps and some cash, the amount of which has not been made public. The safe was wrecked about a year ago, at which time the robbers got about \$200 in money.
