The city attorney reported in the matter of ordinance providing for the construction of gas mains in Green Bay Road, south, that he had conferred with the Mayor, Commissioner of Public Works, and the attorney for the Gas Co., and that he would recommend the passage of the ordinance, providing for the construction of a four inch gas main along said street  
Alderman Bahr moved, seconded by alderman Stevens, a suspension of the rules for the purpose of acting upon an ordinance providing for the construction of a gas main in Green Bay Road, south. Motion was carried.  
Alderman Bahr, moved, seconded by Alderman Stevens the adoption of an ordinance granting to the North Shore Consolidated Gas Company, the right to lay gas mains to supply gas along Green Bay Road in the City of Highland Park, commencing at the intersection of Green Bay Road with Deerfield avenue, running thence southerly to the southern limits of the City of Highland Park. Carried, ayes; alderman Tillman, Kline, Everhart, McPherson, Doty, Stevens and Bahr.  
The attorney reported that the Revision of the City Ordinance was ready for publication and recommended that advertisement for bids for printing said revision be made.  
Alderman Bahr moved, seconded by alderman Stevens that the Judiciary Committee be instructed to call for bids for said work. Said committee to present bids to this
