AN ORDINANCE.

To levy and Appropriate Taxes for the year A. D. 1910 for the Village of Glencoe, Cook County, Illinois.

Be it obtained by the President and Board of Trustees of the Village of Glencoe, Cook County, Illinois, as assessed for State and County purposes according to law, there is hereby levied for the year A. D. 1910 the amounts and for the purpose herein severally set forth, to-wit:

Total for Bonds and Interest \$4222 50. For the payment of Special Assessments Levied and assessed against the Village of Glencoe on account of property owned by the municipality and for public bene. \$1800 00.

Table with columns for item description and amounts. Includes 'FOR THE PAYMENT OF GENERAL EXPENSES FOR THE VILLAGE AS FOLLOWS:' and 'FOR ALL OTHER PURPOSES, USES AND EXPENSES OF SAID VILLAGE OF GLENCOE, NOT OTHERWISE PROVIDED FOR, EXCEPT FOR THE ESTABLISHMENT OF A FREE PUBLIC LIBRARY:'.

Total for General Village Expenses \$141,500 00 \$17,290 00. For the establishment and maintenance of a Free Public Library, a sum equal to two mills on the dollar of the equalized valuation of property so assessed, which said sum shall be in addition to and exclusive of the amount authorized to be levied and assessed for general purposes.

Section 2. The sums and amounts so levied in the foregoing section hereof are hereby appropriated for the purposes and uses therein specified. Section 3. The Village Clerk is hereby directed to certify and deliver a copy of this Ordinance forthwith to the County Clerk of Cook County, Ill.
