COUNCIL CHAMBER, CITY OF HIGHLAND PARK.

Minutes of Regular Meeting of the City Council Of The City Of Highland Park Held On Tuesday Evening, November 1, 1910

HIGHLAND PARK, ILL. November 1st, 1910.

Approved, George A. Mason. Alderman McPherson moved, seconded by Alderman Tillman, a suspension of the rules for the purpose of acting upon the report of the Street and Alley Committee. Motion was carried.

Alderman McPherson moved, seconded by Alderman Doty that the report of the Street and Alley Committee be approved and the recommendations therein be concurred in. Carried. Ayes: Alderman Tillman, Kline, Everhart, McPherson, Doty, Stevens and Bahr.

Alderman McPherson introduced an ordinance entitled "An ordinance authorizing and directing the execution and issuance of the negotiable coupon bonds of the City of Highland Park, Illinois to an amount aggregating the principal sum of \$7500, for the purpose of refunding a like amount of the legal outstanding bonds of said city; prescribing the forms of said bonds and of the interest coupons to be thereto attached; providing for the levy and collection of a direct annual tax sufficient to pay the interest and principal of said bonds when due; and fixing the other details of the issue." Said ordinance was then read in full by the clerk.

Moved by Alderman McPherson and seconded by Alderman Everhart that the rules be suspended, and said ordinance placed upon its passage without reference or engrossment.

The roll was called on motion with the following result: Those voting Ayes: Alderman Tillman, Kline, Everhart, McPherson, Doty, Stevens and Bahr. Those voting "No" none.

And the motion was, by the mayor declared carried, and the rules suspended.

Moved by Alderman McPherson and seconded by Alderman Everhart that said ordinance be passed as read.

The roll was called with the following result: Those voting Ayes: Alderman Tillman, Kline, Everhart, McPherson, Doty, Stevens and Bahr. Those voting "No" none.

And the motion was by the mayor declared carried and said ordinance duly passed.

A petition was presented signed by property owners on Deerfield avenue between First street and Green Bay Road, requesting the Council to pass an ordinance for gas on the said street between said points. The ordinance was also presented, providing for the construction of a gas main in Deerfield avenue.

Alderman Bahr moved, seconded by Alderman Stevens, a suspension of the rules for the purpose of acting upon said ordinance. Motion was carried.

Alderman Bahr moved, seconded by Alderman Stevens, the adoption of an ordinance granting to the North Shore Consolidated Gas Company the right to lay a gas main and supply gas along Deerfield avenue in the City of Highland Park from Hickory street eastward to Green Bay Road. Ayes: Alderman Tillman, Kline, Everhart, McPherson, Doty, Stevens and Bahr.

An ordinance concerning the sale and distribution of ice was presented. Alderman Bahr moved, seconded by Alderman Doty, that the license fee provided in said ordinance be fixed at the sum of \$25.00 per annum for each ice dealer. Motion was carried.

Alderman McPherson moved, seconded by Alderman Doty, a suspension of the rules for the purpose of acting upon said ordinance. Motion was carried.

Alderman Bahr moved, seconded by Alderman Doty the adoption of an ordinance concerning the sale and distribution of ice, providing for the examination of same and providing for the licensing of ice dealers in the City of Highland Park. Carried. Ayes: Alderman Tillman, Kline, Everhart, McPherson, Doty, Stevens and Bahr.

An ordinance licensing vehicles. Alderman McPherson moved seconded by Alderman Bahr that an ordinance be engrossed and that copies of same be furnished to each alderman. Motion was carried.

An ordinance regulating the stoppage and speed of cars and trains of electric railroads and street railroads was presented.

Alderman McPherson moved seconded by Alderman Tillman a suspension of the rule for the purpose of acting upon said ordinance. Motion was carried. Alderman Bahr voting "Nay".

On motion duly seconded the ordinance was then ordered engrossed. The matter of revoking the permit of Chicago & Milwaukee Electric Railroad Company for hauling crushed stone and gravel was then discussed by the Council with reference to the completion of certain contracts now under way in the City.

There upon Alderman Doty moved seconded by Alderman Kline that the permit of the Chicago & Milwaukee Electric Railroad Company for hauling crushed stone and gravel into and through the City of Highland Park be extended until November 30, 1910 and that the City Clerk be instructed to notify the Chicago & Milwaukee Electric Railroad Company on November 20, 1910 of the expiration of their permit ten days from that date. Motion was carried. Alderman McPherson voted "Nay".

Bids for printing and binding of the Revised Ordinances were then opened and read.

Alderman McPherson moved, seconded by Alderman Stevens that the bid of Barnard & Miller being the lowest and best bid be accepted and that the City Clerk be authorized to order said Barnard & Miller to furnish 800 copies of said Revision at a cost of \$200 and an extra cost of \$10 for each eight pages that copy may run over 250 sheets, and an allowance of \$10 for each eight pages that copy may run less than 250 sheets, in accordance with their bid. Carried. Ayes: Alderman Tillman, Kline, Everhart, McPherson, Doty, Stevens and Bahr.

Alderman Stevens moved, seconded by Alderman Kline that a fee of fifty cents be charged for each copy of the Revised Ordinances. Motion was carried.

Alderman Stevens moved, seconded by Alderman Everhart that the Commissioner of Public Works be instructed to order Balluster Bails placed on concrete bridges now under construction in the City of Highland Park. The said Commissioner to use his best judgment in the interests of the said city in ordering said change. Carried. Ayes: Alderman Tillman, Kline, Everhart, McPherson, Doty, Stevens and Bahr.

Alderman Everhart that the balance of the sum of \$779.88 to the credit of the City Deposits Fund be transferred to the credit of the Park fund. Carried. Ayes: Alderman Tillman, Kline, Everhart, McPherson, Doty, Stevens and Bahr.

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
