To his son, William Lovel Underwood, the testator bequeathed a heavy gold watch, which had long since ceased to record the flight of time. It had belonged to Mr Underwood's great grandfather.

Amahogany cane with ivory head which formerly belong to Capt. John Wighton of the Third Pennsylvania regiment in the revolutionary war, goes to the son. Both under the stipulations will remain treasurers to be passed down from son to son for all times.

Both the heirlooms have been exhibited to friends by Mr. Underwood and their stories have been told and retold.

The estate was left entirely to the widow, Mrs. George Lovell Underwood, Mr Underwood died a week ago.
