The said Court by order duly entered herein having directed that notice be given to the said defendants and to all whom it may concern by publication as by law required in the North Shore News-Letter, a newspaper published in the City of Highland Park, County of Lake and State of Illinois.

Notice is hereby given to all whom it may concern, that the City of Highland Park heretofore filed its petition in the County Court of Lake County Illinois on the common law side thereof, praying for the ascertainment of the just compensation to be made for private property to be taken or damaged for acquiring lands necessary for the construction of a sewage purification works of McDaniel Avenue Sewer case, No. 188, in the City of Highland Park, County of Lake, and State of Illinois, and of what property will be benefited thereby and the amount of such benefit the estimated cost of such improvement being the sum of \$2120 00.
