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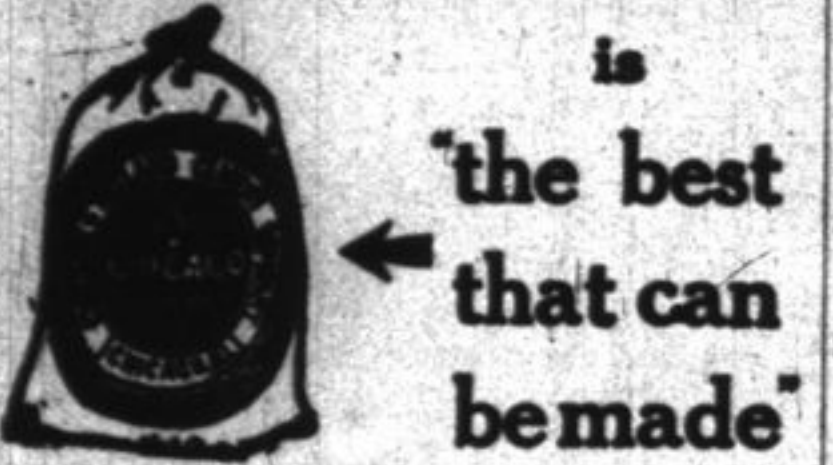


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LOCAL AND PERSONAL NEWS

Notice is hereby given to all persons interested that the City Council of the City of Highland Park, County of Lake and State of Illinois having ordered the construction of a subway under the tracks of the Chicago & Northwestern Railway Company, and the grading, draining, curbing and paving with a brick pavement, with bitumen filler, upon a concrete base, with sand cushion including the re-adjustment of intersecting pavements and of the sanitary sewer, and the construction of sidewalks and otherwise improving Laurel Avenue, from the west line of paving on St. Johns Avenue, westerly to the paved roadway on First Street and including the intersection with the paved roadway on First Street, all in the City of Highland Park, Lake County, Illinois, the ordinance for the same being on file in the office of the City Clerk of said city and having applied to the County Court of Lake County for an assessment of the costs of said improvement according to benefits, and an assessment thereof having been made and returned to said court, the final hearing thereon will be had on the 23rd day of August A. D. 1912 or as soon thereafter as the business of the court will permit. Said assessment is payable in five installments, with interest at the rate of five (5) per centum per annum on all installments from and after date of issue of first voucher. All persons desiring may file objections in said court before said day and may appear on the hearing and make their desense.
