

MORE WORK FOR EXPRESS AGENTS

Members of Methodist Church Bible New Shipping Blank Requires Complete History of Shipment. Commerce Commission Ruling

Local agents of the express companies are notifying their patrons that under a new ruling of the interstate commerce commission, which becomes effective September 1st, it will be necessary to give more time for billing shipments. On every package there must be placed a Shore Encampment. sticker, showing the rate, to whom it is shipped and by whom, the charges, whether it is to go prepaid or collect and a list of the contents.

There are two blanks to be filled, one Will be Held on Farewell Field Labor for collect and the other for prepaid packages. The new rule of the interstate commerce commission insists that one or the other of these blanks properly filled out be attached to every shipment. The purpose of the rule is to prevent double payment of express charges, regarding which there has been considerable complaint in some of the larger cities. The blank will indicate to the consignee whether or not he has charges to pay when the package is delivered.
