EXAMINATION FOR POSTMASTER

Civil Service Commission Announces Examination for Ravinia Office

The United States Civil Service Commission announces that on Saturday, October 5, an examination will be held at Highland Park, Ill., to fill a contemplated vacancy in the position of fourth class postmaster of class (A) at Ravinia, Ill. The compensation of the postmaster at this office was \$539, for the last fiscal year.

Applicants must reside within the territory supplied by the post office for which the examination is announced. The examination is open to all citizens of the United States who can comply with the requirements. Application forms and full information concerning the requirements of the examination can be secured from the postmaster at Ravinia and the local secretary at Highland Park or from the U. S. Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C.

Applications should be properly executed and filed with the Commission at Washington within 7 days before the date of the examination, otherwise it may be impracticable to examine the applicants.
