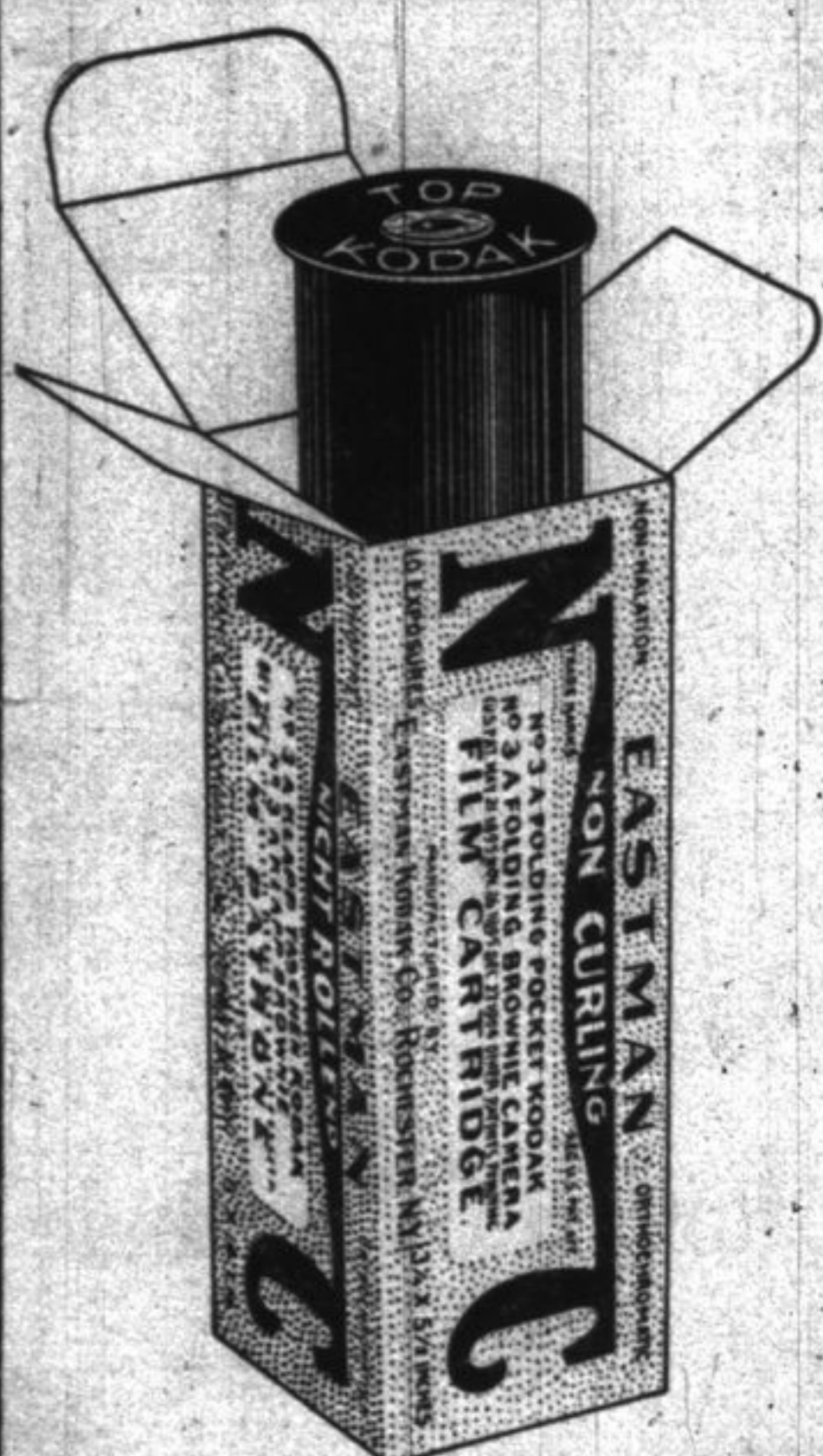

THE OLD OAKEN BUCKET.

That Famous Moss Covered One That Hung In the Well.

Not far from Boston is located the well which inspired the familiar lines of Samuel Woodworth to the "Old Oaken Bucket." Every time the place is visited many new traditions are told concerning the famous old bucket about which people have been singing these many years. Having drunk deep of the sparkling waters between whistled snatches of the familiar refrain, how disconcerting it was to have the charm broken by learning that the original "old oaken bucket" was stolen shortly after his well known poem became famous!

The youngest daughter of Samuel Woodworth, the author, who died in Berkeley, Cal., often used to tell about the real old oaken bucket and of the sadness which came over the household on the day it was stolen. It seemed as if one of the family were missing. In this age of souvenir collection who knows but that some day the real old "moss covered bucket that hung in the well" may turn up in a museum or serve as a water tank in the show windows of some enterprising advertiser?

There is no other water bucket in the world so enshrined in homely, genuine romance as this one. Even the golden goblets of royalty and the treasured chalices of the crusaders have never awakened the universal and popular interest attained by the "old oaken bucket that hung in the well" until it was stolen and carried away in the zenith of its fame.—Joe Mitchell, Chapter in National Magazine.

The Guest House in Asia Minor.

The guest house is a real institution in Asia Minor. It is sometimes owned by an individual, but is usually the common property of the village. Stuffed Ham.

Select a freshly cured ham and have bone removed. Fill cavity with stuffing made of breadcrumbs, tie up securely and inclose ham in a paste of flour and water to keep juice from escaping. Tie in a pudding bag or cloth, have ready a pot of boiling water and let ham boil slowly about two hours. When boiled sufficiently remove the crust, pare skin off carefully so as not to injure the shape of the ham, put it in a roasting pan, sprinkle with breadcrumbs and set in a moderate oven to roast.

Peach Batty.

Chop fine two cupfuls of not too ripe peaches. Batter a baking dish and place on it a layer of peaches, sprinkling with cinnamon, sugar and butter. Place on this a layer of the crumbs, alternating with the peaches until the dish is three-quarters full, leaving breadcrumbs on the top. Add no water, but cover tight and steam three-quarters of an hour in moderate oven. Remove, cover and brown quickly. Serve with milk or cream.

RAVINIA CONCRETE PAVING COMPLETED

wouldn't be paying a lot of money for a paving only to find that before the last installment of the assessment was due, it was necessary to pave again.

Surprising as it may seem concrete roads are cheap, about as cheap as macadam, and far cheaper than brick, bitulithic or wood-block. For example the Ravinia paving, including excavation, drainage, curbs, roadway, all complete averaged per front foot about \$2.75. An owner of a 100 foot lot would thus pay \$27.50 per year, for ten years. The cost of repaving such an artery as Sheridan Road with concrete however, would be much less, because Sheridan Road is already graded and much of the drainage could be made use of. Furthermore the present macadam roadway would make an admirable foundation for the concrete. It would have to be scarified, i. e. broken up with a heavy roller equipped for the purpose, the stone properly spread out to give a 25-foot roadway, fully equal to a 30-foot macadam, as explained heretofore) curbs and extra drainage taken care of, and then an 8-inch concrete top put on. This can be done at an expense not exceeding \$2.00 a front foot, or \$20.00 per year for the owner of a 100-foot lot. And when it is done there will be an end to the eternal patching that must be continually going on in order to make the average macadam road even passable. Sheridan Road however has borne the brunt of all the north and south traffic of all kinds east of the C. & N. W. tracks for far too long a time. Other streets should be opened up to relieve this one, and if I can accomplish it, they will be. Particularly important is the paving of Railway Ave. from Beach St. south to Ravinia Park, and also Lincoln Avenue, from Beach St. to Cedar St. and Cedar from Lincoln to Sheridan Road."
