TURKS FALLING BACK

Slay Peasants and Burn Villages as They Go.

Great Victory Reported by the Serb-Bulgarian Army—Capture 20,000 Prisoners.

London, Oct. 22.—The capitals of the allied Balkan states are claiming victories for their troops over Turkey. From the field headquarters of the Bulgarians comes word that the Turks are falling back to Adrianople in confusion, burning villages and massacring peasants as they flee.

The Greek fleet, says Athens, has blockaded the island of Lemnos and that Turkish island is being occupied by Greek troops.

The Bulgarians are said to have captured Kirk-Killesseh after days of severe fighting around that town. The Serb-Bulgarian army claims to have taken 20,000 prisoners, three months' food supplies and ammunition there for a whole army corps. Kirk-Killesseh is but thirty-two miles from Adrianople and a report says that the victorious invaders pressed and stormed the northern forts of Adrianople and cut communication between the city and the outside world. None of these reports, however, has official verification. The Serbs are said to have captured Nevavars in the Snajka of Novibazar, where there was the hottest sort of fighting.

SAY'S SPOUSE SHOT SELF

Wife of Frank Robertson and Her Sister Questioned by Attorney.

Milwaukee, Wis., Oct. 22.—Mrs. Mary Robertson, thirty-three years old, and her sister, Mrs. Georgia Bowers, Ottawa, Ill., were questioned at length by District Attorney W. C. Zabel, regarding the death of Frank Robertson, a musician, the former's husband.

The inquisition by Zabel was at the request of Coroner Nahlin, who performed an autopsy on the man's body. Mrs. Robertson said her husband shot himself when she and her sister returned home at 2:30 a. m., after making the rounds of local palm gardens accompanied by Carl Wheelock, a friend. Her husband was asleep and when awakened when they returned, she said, without a word he shot himself and died soon afterward.

PROBE LAKE WRECK

Captain of Lost Steamer Says Crossed Signals Caused Crash.

Detroit, Mich., Oct. 22.—To determine the cause and fix the blame for the collision between the steamers Pine Lake and Fleetwood, which resulted in the sinking of the former and drowning of two members of her crew, an investigation by federal inspectors has been started.

The accident occurred in Lake St. Clair, off Peche Island. Captain Ferguson of the Pine Lake said "crossed signals" were responsible. The victims were Alexander Kalvey of London, Ont., a wheelman, and an unidentified sailor.

BROKER KILLS HIMSELF

Chicagoan Puts Bullet in Head While Sitting in Park.

Chicago, Oct. 22.—Charles S. Hooper, president of Charles S. Hooper & Co., dealers in commercial paper, who shot himself in the head while seated on a bench in Washington park, died at the Washington Park hospital.

It is believed that Mr. Hooper was made desperate over troubles not known to members of his family.

LIVING COST ON WANE, SAYS TAFT

Issues Statement after Getting Agricultural Report

MEAT PRICES DUE TO RECED

Secretary Wilson Gives Bumper Crops as Reason for Deduction; Saving \$500,000,000—Farmers Still to Profit.

Beverly, Mass., Oct. 21.—In a statement, based upon reports from Secretary of Agriculture James Wilson, President Taft declares that the wave of high prices for food throughout the world has begun to subside in this country.

"The wave of extremely high prices for food throughout the civilized world," read the president's state-

ment, "has reached its height in the United States and is subsiding.

"The American people have cause to be thankful first because of our industrial prosperity it has not been attended here with the great hardship which has prevailed in some of the countries where high prices have combined with low wages to reduce the working people to a point bordering on starvation."

Bumper Crops Will Affect Prices.

According to the announcement of White House officials, Secretary Wilson made an investigation of the causes of the prices and the effect of the bumper crops in the United States upon such prices.

The great prosperity of the American farmer, the report to the president showed, has brought about a material decrease in the cost of food products, although in many instances the reduction will not become apparent to the consumer for several months. The report promises that the price of meat will decrease notably on account of the bumper corn crop after cattle, sheep and hogs fed from that crop reach the consumer.

Savings Will Be \$500,000,000.

Secretary Wilson advised the president that of the nine great crops of the country, corn, wheat, oats, barley,

rye, buckwheat, potatoes, faxseed, and hay, the Oct. 1 prices indicated a saving to the consumer of about 9 per cent, or nearly \$500,000,000.

The crop increase will make up to farmers, however, reductions in price. Mr. Wilson shows that while the return to the producers on Oct. 1, 1914, amounted to \$2,868,000,000, at the prices prevailing Oct. 1 of this year, their return will be \$4,454,000,000.

Mr. Wilson's report, according to officials here, shows that the aggregate crop in the United States will be about 20 per cent greater than it has been for years. He shows that the wheat crop of the year is nearly 100,000,000 bushels greater than last year, and says that one high grade flour is costing at the mills 80 cents a barrel less than it did a year ago.

Corn Crop Record Breaker.

The corn crop, Mr. Wilson points out, exceeds 2,000,000,000 bushels, and there has already been a decrease in price of corn of 7 cents per bushel.

The hay crop, he says, has increased more than 17,000,000 tons over a year ago, and he declares that in consequence the price per ton has fallen \$2.74.

This decrease, he maintains, will not only decrease the price of meats, but of milk, butter, cheese, etc.

600 STARVE TO DEATH

Frightful Condition of Affairs Reported in Venezuela.

Babe Killed and Eaten by Its Two Elder Brothers—Politics Blamed for Conditions

New York, Oct. 21.—Conditions of extreme privation in Venezuela are described in a letter written from Caracas by a correspondent of the Tribune.

In the state of Trujillo more than 600 persons have starved to death during the past season.

"The bodies of an entire family whose members starved to death were found in one house," the letter continues.

"One almost incredible consequence of the pangs of hunger was the killing of a baby by his two older brothers, who ate the body."

"Blame for the famine is placed upon political conditions, which has led to neglect of agriculture."
