**MODERN WOODMEN RATE CASE**

Heard Before Judge Shirley at Springfield and Decision is Awaited

The suit of four members at Springfield, Ill., to enjoin the Modern Woodmen of America from putting into effect the plans and rates adopted at Chicago in January 1912, by the Head Camp, the legislative body of the Society, was before Judge Shirley in circuit court at Springfield from September 3 to September 17. On the latter date the oral arguments were concluded and counsel was allowed three weeks in which to submit written arguments. Judge Shirley is expected to review the record thoroughly before announcing his decision. Mr. J. G. Johnston of Kansas, one of the attorneys for plaintiffs, stated in the course of his oral argument that an appeal from Judge Shirley's decision would certainly be taken.

Judge Bradshaw began the hearing of a similar proceeding at Des Moines, Ia., on the day the oral arguments before Judge Shirley were concluded.
