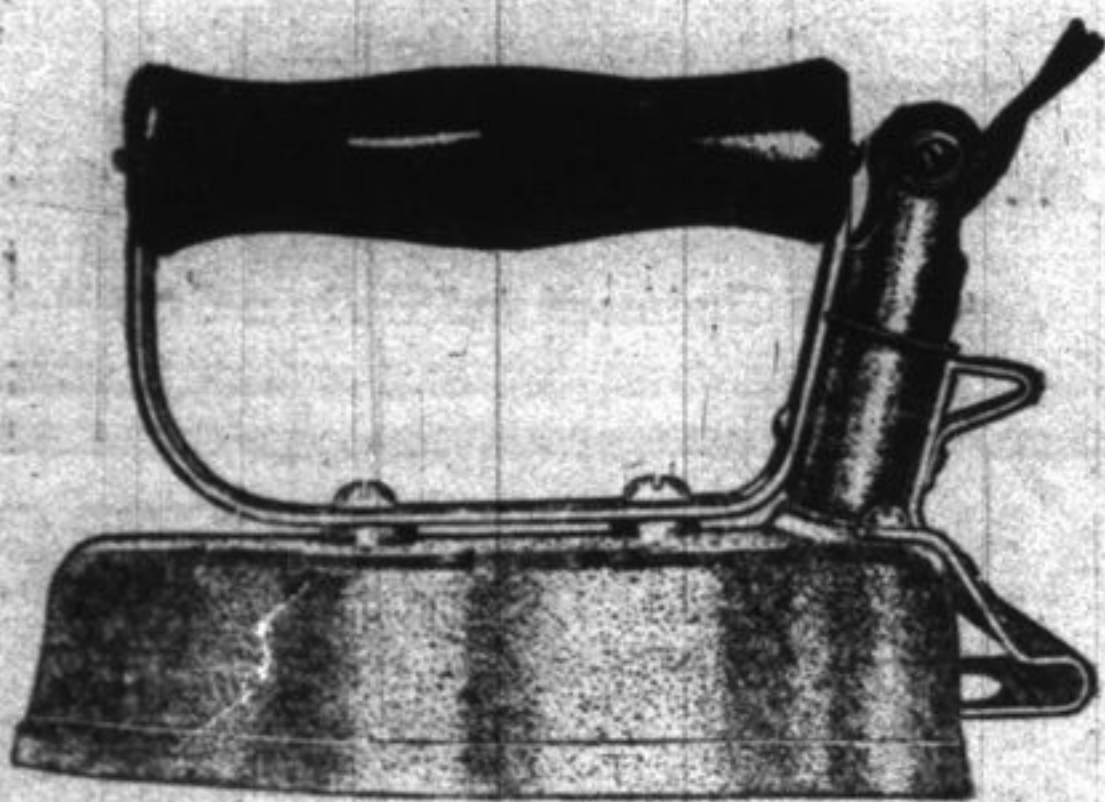

#### Obituary

Emma A. Elliott

The death of Miss Emma A. Elliott, for over thirty-seven years a resident of Highland Park, occurred on Friday morning, October eighteenth at one o'clock after an illness of six weeks. She was born in Turin, N. Y. July 31, 1840 and at the age of three years came to Antioch, Ill. with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. John H. Elliott who were of English birth. After the death of her parents she came here to live with her older sister, Miss Therese Elliott who had preceded her to take charge of the primary department of the Elm Place Grammar school where she was the first teacher in that now large school. There was a younger brother, William H. Elliott who died at his home in Ravenswood about three years ago.

The funeral services which were conducted by Rev. Henry Clay Miller, were held at ten o'clock Sunday morning and were beautiful in character. Hymns were sung by Mrs. J. E. Bittinger and her son, Leigh, Rev. Miller and Charity McKenzie, members of the choir of the Baptist church. The interment was at Oakwood cemetery, Chicago. The most profound sympathy for the sister, Miss Therese Elliott, who is called upon to bear this sorrow and loss, is felt by her acquaintances and friends.

Miss Emma Elliott had, during her life, the last years of which she had not been well, become identified with the work of the Baptist church where she gave her assistance in a quiet but thoroughly successful manner. To many in Highland Park she was not known but to her friends and neighbors and many of the sick and poor she will always be held in memory as an example of love, nobleness and justice. She gave freely and was thoughtful upon all occasions. It was one of her greatest pleasures to take her garden flowers, that she had worked over so tenderly, to the sick and many such incidents are remembered.

Darwin A. Clark

The death of Darwin A. Clark occurred at the Home for Disabled and Crippled Railroad Employees on Monday morning. He was a native of Wisconsin, was fifty years of age and had resided at the Home one year after having been employed as a freeman. The funeral was held at two o'clock on Wednesday afternoon at Prior's Undertaking Rooms. The interment took place at Mooney's cemetery.
