## NEXT CONGRESS IS DEMOCRATIC

Wilson Will Have 203 Party Men Back of Him.

### SENATE IS STILL VERY CLOSE

Returns Indicate Dixon Will Be Defeated in Montana—Democratic Gains Mostly Made East of Mississippi.

Washington, Nov. 6.—Reports indicate that President-Elect Woodrow Wilson will have a Democratic congress with which to inaugurate his policies. From incomplete returns the next house of representatives will be composed of 283 Democrats, 138 Republicans and thirteen Progressives.

Joseph G. Cannon, former speaker of the house was defeated for re-election to congress in the Eighteenth Illinois district by Frank T. O'Hair by about 800 votes.

#### Senate Will Be Close.

The senate is close, but probably Democratic. Present membership is made up of fifty Republicans, forty-three Democrats and three vacancies, Illinois, Idaho and Colorado.

The indications are that the Democrats will have fifty-one senators and the Republicans and Progressives forty-five.

Colorado appears to have elected a complete Democratic legislature, which will elect two United States senators. Massachusetts apparently has elected a Democratic legislature, which will choose a successor to Senator Murray Crane. In Delaware the legislature is in doubt; in Nebraska early returns indicate a Democratic landslide and this may cause the election of a Democratic senator from that state.

#### Dixon May Lose Seat.

In New Jersey, President-Elect Wilson's home, a United States senator will also be elected. Montana also elects a United States senator, and as the result there is in doubt Senator Dixon may lose his seat.

Conservative estimates would indicate that the next United States senate will undoubtedly be Democratic. This will give Mr. Wilson a working majority in both houses of congress.

The greatest gains made by the Democrats were in the states east of the Mississippi. In the Wilson landslide his party picked up congressional seats in Massachusetts, New York, Pennsylvania, New Jersey and Delaware. In the central west the Democrats may have also gained one or two seats in Ohio, one in Indiana, two in Illinois and one in Missouri.

#### Strength of Progressives.

The Progressive strength of thirteen as indicated by the returns, does not really show the fighting power that they will have in the next congress. Many of the so-called Republican congressmen in the northwest, on the coast and in the central west, openly espoused the cause of Mr. Roosevelt and will be found lined up with the Progressive forces.

### TAFT HEARS THE NEWS

Receives Intelligence of Democratic Victory at Brother's Home.

Cincinnati, O., Nov. 6.—President Taft received news of his defeat at the home of his brother, C. P. Taft, on Pike street, shortly before dinner. A telegraph office was set up in one of the rooms of the mansion and as soon as the wires were opened at 6 o'clock bulletins telling of Governor Wilson's election and the Democratic landslide began pouring over the wires in rapid succession.

With the president were his brother, C. P. Taft, and Mrs. C. P. Taft, Mrs. Louise Taft, Major Thomas L. Rhodes, the president's military aid, and several personal friends.

### CHAMP CLARK RE-ELECTED

Speaker of House Goes to Washington for Ninth Term.

Montgomery, Mo., Nov. 6.—Beyond a doubt Champ Clark, speaker of the house of representatives, has been re-elected to congress from this district for the ninth time.

His opponent, W. L. Cole, prosecuting attorney of Franklin county, made an active canvass, but he was unable to decrease Clark's majority.

#### Kentucky Congressmen Mixed.

Louisville, Ky., Nov. 6.—Berkley, Stanley, Johnson, Shirley, Rouse, Cantrell and Fields in the first nine congressional districts respectively (all Democrats) have received safe majorities. Langley, Republican, in the Tenth district, is without opposition. Seavey, Progressive, in the Eleventh district, is leading and appears to be the winner.

#### Former Speaker Cannon Defeated.

Danville, Ill., Nov. 6.—The vote in this city is more than two to one for Roosevelt over Wilson and Taft. The indications are that Former Speaker Uncle Joe Cannon went down to defeat.

#### Election News

That few voters took the trouble to mark their ballots for county officers is shown by the fact that Brockway, who received the biggest vote of any county candidate, has a total of only 584 while one candidate for president, Roosevelt, has 658.

In the first precinct the judges worked until six o'clock Wednesday morning in an attempt to finish the count and then left the job to be finished later in the day. Owing to the unusual number and variety of scratched ballots in this precinct the work of counting was a big task. One ballot had votes in every column.

The Roosevelt vote of 658 in this township exceeded that of all other presidential candidates combined, 630 by 28 votes.

Munro in this township received over one-fourth more than the total of all other candidates for Representative from this district, the totals being Munro 2185, others 1555.

Densen received 119 more votes in Deerfield township than did Taft, taking 98 from Funk, who received that many less than Roosevelt, and 21 from Dunne who was that many behind Wilson.

### MASSACHUSETTS FOR WILSON

Governor Foss Is Re-Elected by Large Majority.

Boston, Mass., Nov. 6.—Wilson swept Massachusetts by a vote exceeding that of Taft and Roosevelt combined, carrying with him a large portion of the state ticket. Governor Foss, Democrat, is re-elected by a large plurality. Indications are the legislature will be Democratic.

Chairman Riley of the Democratic state committee says: "Wilson will have 80,000 majority in Massachusetts, while Governor Foss will be re-elected by 70,000."

### WILSON GETS 25,000 AT HOME

New Jersey Also Choses Ten or Twelve Democratic Congressmen.

Newark, N. J., Nov. 6.—Wilson has carried the state. Ten or twelve Democratic congressmen have been elected. The claim is also made that there will be a Democratic majority on joint ballot in the legislature, thus making it certain that a Democratic United States senator will be chosen. Wilson's plurality is 25,000.

### ALABAMA FOR WILSON

State Democratic Ticket Elected and Congressmen Re-Chosen.

Birmingham, Ala., Nov. 6.—Alabama gives Wilson about 80,000; Roosevelt about 20,000 and Taft about 15,000.

All Democratic candidates for congress re-elected, with little doubt of seventeenth district, where John L. Burnett was pushed by Sumter Cogswell, Progressive. Entire state Democratic ticket elected.

#### Keystone Republican Congressmen

Philadelphia, Pa., Nov. 6.—Pennsylvania congressmen elected: Vare, Republican, first; Graham, Republican, second; Moore, Republican, third; Edmonds, Republican, fourth; Grist, Republican, ninth; Farr, Republican, tenth; Hartman, Republican, nineteenth; Patton, Republican, twenty-first; Laugham, Republican, twenty-seventh; Porter, Republican, twenty-ninth; Kelley, Republican, thirtieth; Burke, Republican, thirty-first; Barchfield, Republican, thirty-second; at large, Morin, Lewis Walters, Ripley, Republicans.

Wilson Gets Florida Electors. Tallahassee, Fla., Nov. 6.—This state gives her six electoral votes to Wilson by a big majority.
