TURKS IN PLEA FOR MEDIATION

Acknowledge Their Defeat to Powers of Europe.

NATIONS WILL NOT INTERVENE

Constantinople, Filled with Refugee from Outlying Districts and Fleeing Soldiers, is Obsessed by Fear.

London, Nov. 4.- Turkey's plea for intervention to stop the Balkan war has been made in vain. The powers appealed to have notified the porte that the war must continue.

Some of the governments pointed out that Turkey's proposal for a cessation of hostilities-in other words an armistice-would offend the Balkan victors. Others take the position that it would be an infringement of international law for the moment.

London, Nov. 4. - There is a dispatch from Constantinople that the Turks have turned to the powers with an admission that they have been beaten and a plea for mediation. This application is said to have been made to the foreign ambassadors in Constantinople and to the powers through the porte's representatives in the chancellories of Europe. Mediation. with a view to the cessation of hostilities, and the opening of peace negotiations with the Balkan allies is said to be the request of the porte. Fear Grips Constantinople.

The reinforced Turks are turning on their pursuers and fighting between Istranja and Seral, while anwher division is heading for Tchataldja. It is doubtful if this division, so close pressed are they by the victorious Bulgars, can reach their goal. In the meantime the powers are recognizing the serious situation at Constantinople. The sultan's city is filling up with fugitives from the countryside and Ottoman troops who ran before the allies, and their presence serves to fan the flames of fear that run through the capital.




