IT'S A BEAR, "THE MILLION"

New Farce at the Olympic Theatre, Chicago Proves a big hit

Chicago's biggest theatrical opening in years, measured from box office receipts, was the record established by Henry W. Savage's world famous laughing success, "The Million," at the Olympic Theatre last Sunday evening. Fully 2,000 people were turned away after the entire spacious house had been sold out. Even the Olympic's third gallery, a seating portion of the playhouse which had not been opened since 1909, was thrown open to the public and solidly occupied a few minutes later.

Artistic as well as financial was the success scored by this whirlwind comedy at the first performance. Roars of laughter, punctuated by rivulets of chuckles, constantly resounded, and there was deafening applause aplenty, not only after each screaming act, but at the end of many clever scenes and "bits" during the rapid progress of the masterfully merry farce.

The mighty demonstration of public approval was Chicago's first tribute to the joyful production that made New York shake with laughter during an entire season, after having held the boards to enormous patronage for two years in Paris, one year in Vienna and two years in Berlin. The rapid entertainment thoroughly Americanized and cracking with the keen wit and cheery abandon of New York's artistic "Bohemian" set, fairly infatuated its hundreds of auditors. The sensational surprising episodes connected with a funny pursuit of a lottery ticket for \$1,000,000 created hysterical outbursts with the rapidity of an adding machine.

Chicago newspapers were lavish in their praises, the consensus of opinion being that "The Million" was positively funnier than Hoyt's farces, or such modern delights as "Seven Days," "Baby Mine" and "Excuse Me." Miss Amy Leslie, the eminent critic of the The Daily News, devoted two columns to golden praise, ending her eulogy with the following sparkling endorsement: "It's a bear, is 'The Million.'"

Obituary
