ASK COURT MARTIAL FOR FIVE

Highwood Officials want Soldiers who Assaulted Marshal Huestis Punished

Following an attack on Marshal Huestis last Thursday night by five soldiers, O. S. Gooch, city attorney and Joseph Severson, mayor of Highwood, have asked the officers in charge at Fort Sheridan to court martial the men and they state that if the request is not granted a state warrant for the arrest of the men will be demanded. The five men are in the guard house at Fort Sheridan at the present.

Huestis was attacked by the six soldiers when he attempted to quell a riot in Thos. Robbin's restaurant. The proprietor of the restaurant had refused to allow the soldiers to enter his place, and one of them kicked in the glass door.



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
