**Highland Park Woman's Club**

The Highland Park Woman's Club held a meeting on Tuesday afternoon at which the president, Mrs. George H. Campbell announced that the Red Cross Stamps will be on sale this month at Mr. Gsell's Drug Store and 80 per cent of all sold here is to go to the Tuberculosis Camp at Waukegan, she urged all to buy their stamps here as it is the hope that we may come up to the record of two years ago when ten thousand stamps were sold. Mrs. John Putnam then made announcement of an invitation from the Ossoli Club to the members of the Woman's Club and their husbands to be present tonight to hear a lecture on suffrage. She then read resolutions, that had been adopted by the Ministers Federated Association and Chicago Woman's Club, pertaining to the Christmas Crusade and a message asking that this club adopt the plan of a "Sane Christmas", which they did.

Mention was made by Mrs. Williams of the work being done by the girls and young women of the Y. W. C. A. in their endeavors to obtain new subscriptions and renewals of the Highland Park Press, by which the Association is to be benefited and the girls receive a prize.

Mention was also made of the effort to establish a Woman's exchange at the Association rooms, on each Saturday. Mrs. John Putnam then gave an account of her visit to Gad's Hill last Thursday urging others to go, and give what help they could, it being a stimulant that is much needed to the work there.

The program for the afternoon was in charge of Mrs. C. H. Baker. Miss McCrystal gave three delightful piano selections the first two from the Children's Corner by De Bussey and the last "Wild Chase" by MacDowell. Mrs. Baker who had been sent as the Club's delegate to the State Federation meeting at Aurora, gave a most interesting summary of the meeting. All enjoyed the little personal touch of her start and her arrival at Aurora, followed by a brief summary of the opening address by Mrs. S. Granger, president of the Ill. State Federation of Women's Clubs. Mrs. Baker read a part of Mrs. Pennypacker's address, the subject of which was "Some dangers to the American home".

Part of two other addresses were read by Mrs. F. B. Green and Mrs. J. C. Morrison. Plans for the endowment fund which is to be a memorial to Mrs. Decker were discussed.
