The Highland Park Club

On Friday evening, Dec. 30th, there will be a dance at half after eight o'clock. No pictures will be shown that evening.

On Tuesday evening, the 17th, the monthly card party will be held at which bridge and 500 are to be played.

Many requests are made upon the entertainment committee for a repetition of moving pictures that have been particularly fine and which some members have missed by being unable to be present. An explanation is made to show that it is not always possible to obtain these pictures again as for instance in the case of "The Great Fire Scene," without doubt one of the finest pictures ever shown here. On last Friday special conditions were made for the production as this picture was booked to be shown in Minneapolis on the following Saturday night and these bookings are made many weeks in advance. The opportunity for the Club's producing it again will not occur for some time. Another Pathe picture will be shown on Friday, Dec. 20th, and another on the 27th.

That it takes an amateur play to draw an audience was shown on Tuesday night when the club ballroom was literally packed with friends and relatives of the actors in "The Southern Musical Party" presented under the direction of Mrs. C. E. Schaffler. Certainly it was the surprise that had previously been announced and it would be difficult to single out any particular musical act for especial praise. However mention should be made of the excellent acting of the following children: Margaret Sedgwick, Victoria Luther, Weidig Colburn, Gerazine Faxon, Mary Helen Colburn, Charles B. Schaffler, Harrington Colburn, Katherine Martin, Francis Colburn, and Eugene Tremaine, whose presence upon the stage lent a rare charm to the setting. Mrs. Schaffler as a negro mammy, was a favorite with the audience and Miss Dorothy Clark as a darkey girl, danced several clogs and was encored repeatedly. The duet sung by Miss Marjorie Loudon and Raymond Lovell, both looking attractive in their costumes of the period of a few years before the Civil war, made a great impression as did Mrs. George Colburn's rendering of the old composition "Floating on the Wind." Mrs. R. J. Beatty's harp solo, the soprano duet in which Miss Mildred Thayer and Miss Loudon were the soloists and the string quartette composed of Miss Grace Dunne, Mr. C. E. Schaffler, Dr. Lloyd Bergen and Mr. George Colburn. That the negro quartette made a great hit was shown in the number of times they were encored and they lustily repeated "Fotch along de Hoe Cake" about four times. Mr. Lloyd Metzler, Mr. Leslie Schaffler, Mr. Bert Renning, and Mr. Goodrich Schaffler were successfully made up as the negro members of this quartette. The part of the typical southern colonel was taken and well acted by Mr. Sidney J. Holland.

Ossoli Club

The number of people composing the audience at the lecture held at the Highland Park club on Thursday evening under the auspices of the Ossoli did not indicate that the subject "Equal Suffrage" is taken as a serious or vital question in this city. While there was an average sized audience it was comparatively small when one takes into consideration that a great many invitations were issued to non-members. There were many leading workers in the cause of suffrage who were not in attendance. The program was one of rare interest for suffragist or anti-suffragist for Mrs. Joseph T. Bowen supplied in the absence of Miss Harriet E. Grim, who fell ill and gave an address filled with sincerity and a knowledge of facts presented in the clear, concise manner of which she is capable after many years devoted to philanthropic work especially among women. Also thoroughly enjoyed was the address made by Dr. William T. McEwen of Evanston, the first man to make a public address in Highland Park in favor of "votes for women." Mrs. Francis D. Everett, who had the evening in charge presided and several brief and informal talks were made by her. Mr. J. S. Norcross, president of the board of education of the Elm Place Grammar School made a plea for the purchase of ground and a new building. Informal discussion of the "Equal Suffrage" subject following the address after which refreshments were served by the hostesses. Mrs. George H.
