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ACCIDENTAL SHOT KILLS BOY

Albert Erickson of Ridge Road Drops Gun Causing Discharge

Accidental discharge of a shot gun caused the death of Albert Erickson, sixteen year old son of Mr. and Mrs. John Erickson last Saturday morning. The boy had taken the gun which was an old one, into the yard to shoot a crow but returned to the house without firing. Returning to the house he dropped the gun carelessly as he attempted to stand it against a chair, the hammer caught on the chair's edge and the gun was discharged, the shot entering the boy's lungs. Dr. Sheldon was called but the boy died before his arrival. The coroner's jury returned a verdict of accidental shooting.

The Erickson's have lived here but a short time, having moved from Racine to the place they now occupy on Ridge Rd. west of Highland Park about a year ago. The father is employed as a teamster by the Aaron Brick Co. and the dead boy was well and favorably known to the employees of this concern and to the neighbors. Funeral services were held Sunday afternoon from the home, Rev. VanEvera preaching the service. Interment was in Mooney's cemetery.
