The City Council at a regular meeting held on January 7, 1913, passed an Ordinance providing for a second or supplemental assessment to pay the amount of deficiency in the first assessment. Special Assessment Docket No. 72, for paving and otherwise improving Central Ave, from Green Bay Road west to the City Limits. The Excess of Liabilities over resources in this assessment as shown by the auditor's report is \$1107.60.
