The Man Across the Street

With all due deference to the alder-
manic right to vote "no" on a question
of a suspension of the rules, or any other
question, the Man Across the Street be-
lieves that Alderman Kimbel's vote which
stopped for one month the passage of an
ordinance for a supplemental assessment
in Special Assessment 73 served no other
purpose than to delay the solution of a
vital problem. To bring an ordinance of
this kind to vote upon the same night it
is introduced a suspension of the rules is
necessary and one vote will block such a
procedure. Alderman Kimbel cast this
vote, as reported in THE PRESS report of
of the council proceedings last week. Or-
dinarily, stopping the hurried passage of
an ordinance in this matter is a good
thing as it gives the aldermen and the
people concerned more opportunity for
investigation but in the case of this as-
sessment the investigating had already
been done, all that remained was the
opinion of the court as to the legality of
the proceeding and to get that opinion the
passage of the ordinance was necessary.
Alderman Kimbel has stated that he
does not believe that the interest
which has piled up in these special as-
sessments should be paid by the owners of
the property benefited by the improve-
ment and in this opinion he has much
company. Nearly all the owners of
frontages on East Park Ave., concerned
in Assessment 73, were present, at the
public hearing and they all voiced this
sentiment. They have, we understand,
engaged a lawyer and will go into court
properly equipped to fight the city. The
courts decision in this case will practi-
cally cover the 127 special assessments to
be settled and it would seem that the
sooner it is brought into court, and
settled the better for all. Alderman
Kimbel's vote only delayed the proceed-
ings for one month, as the ordinance is
almost sure of passage at the next meet-
ing, and by so delaying it left room for
another month's interest on a number of
unpaid bonds to crowd into an already
overcrowded ledger.
