It is necessary that the public be informed of the great need of such a place where the epileptic patients can be properly cared for and the women of the Woman's Club throughout the state are interested and lending their influence to have the bill passed. The condition in this state is deplorable and the concise fact was stated that, since the opening of school in Chicago in September seventy-five epileptic children have been sent home where no proper care can be given them while were they in a colony they could attend school when not in a seizure of epilepsy and when older, support or partly support themselves in the colony.

J. Paul Goode, associate professor in the department of geography at the University of Chicago will give an illustrated lecture on Japan on the evening of Tuesday, February 18, at eight fifteen o'clock. Prof. Goode had the honor in 1909, when sixty Japanese financiers visited this country at the invitation of the Chamber of Commerce of the Pacific Coast cities, to be appointed by President Taft as one of the three men to do the courtesies of the government in escorting the party on their three months tour across the continent and return on a special train visiting in all fifty-seven cities. When Prof. Goode visited Japan a little over a year ago all of these Japanese gentlemen did their best to show him the courtesies of Japan. In every city he was met by a delegation from the Chamber of Commerce and a program was provided for his benefit. He visited the industries and all of his questions were answered in full. This lecture will show the Japanese at work, on the farm, in the market and in the household industries for the industries of Japan are still that of the household although the western factory has been introduced. The views used by Prof. Goode, made in Japan and colored by the Japanese, are exceptionally fine and will, without doubt, please the members and their guests who attend.
