SERIES WILL BEGIN SUNDAY EVENING

Lectures by Rev. W. D. P. Bliss will be Given in Parish House Five Successive Sundays, Omitting Easter

Course of Lectures on Social Problems

On Sunday evening, March 9, at eight o'clock, and on the five following Sundays, omitting Easter, in the Parish House of Trinity church, there will be given the lectures on social problems prepared by Rev. W. D. P. Bliss, editor of the Encyclopedia of Social Reform, and sent out under the auspices of the American Institute of Social Service, of which Dr. Josiah Strong is president.

Each lecture is illustrated with fifty carefully selected stereopticon slides. The subject of the first lecture is "Hours and Wages, or How the Other Half Lives." The subjects discussed are: Real Conditions as to Wages and Hours in the United States, Agriculture, Manufacturing, Mining, Railroads, Accidents, Unemployed, What Employers are doing, The Organization of Labor, Employers' Liability, and The Minimum Wage.

BOY'S DINNER IS GREAT SUCCESS

One Hundred and Fifty Attend Annual High School Affair

The second annual boy's dinner at the high school took place on Saturday evening and was a great success. Dr. P. C. Wolcott, acting as toastmaster, proved to be very humorous and effective in that capacity. Laughter and fun were caused by the fact that each professional man who spoke did not fail to work in a "slam" at the other professions represented. Dr. B. M. Linnell of Chicago, who was the first speaker, told of the physician and his work. During his interesting talk Dr. Linnell gave examples of heroism among physicians, sitting as one, the wonderful sacrificing work of Rickards who gave his life in search for and the discovery of the typhus germ and he spoke too, of the splendid work of the physicians at Panama who made it possible for the engineers to live in that country. Mr. Fayette S. Munro made a very spirited address in which he made his point that wealth is not synonymous with happiness and a man can't best be happy by serving his fellow. Mr. Ernest McCullough, an engineer of note, made an especially fine presentation of the work of an engineer. The disadvantages of that particular profession, he made clear, stating that in the earlier years a man must depend upon seasonable employment and is often out of a job. Mr. S. J. Brickly, principal of the Froebel school, Gary, Ind., said by many to be the finest in the world, told briefly of the work and showed several drawings of the buildings. Here the pupils attend school from eight to five o'clock and they pass from the nursery up through two years of college work.

There were many witty and clever stories told by the speakers during the talks which gave a vein of fun to the whole affair which added to the success. The tables were decorated in spring flowers and palms, and were attractively set. The menu, which was prepared under the supervision of Miss Pyre, was excellent. The Glee Club and the school orchestra furnished music for this occasion at which about one hundred and fifty guests were present.
