LIFE IN MACEDONIA.
It is Very Much in the Open, With Little of No Privacy.
We arose early one February morning and left our fairly clean notes in Neapolis for four hours of travel over the modern road near the Via Egnatia, which should take us to ancient Philippi. Our vehicle was a somewhat dilapidated hack, such as Americans are familiar with at almost every considerable railway station, but a surprisingly comfortable conveyance for this part of the world. Battling down some steep, roughly paved streets, we came to the center of the old Neapolis, passed near the great Roman aqueduct and ascended another steep street on the other side of the market place.
Early as it was, we found that the people of Kavala were up and doing. The stalls of the fruit men were attractive with oranges, pomegranates, lemons and dates. The vegetable dealers displayed a tempting array of cauliflower, artichokes, onions, okra, leeks and potatoes.
As in all eastern cities, there was no privacy. The cook was preparing his breakfast on the sidewalk; the shoemaker was plating his awl, the tailor his needle, and the blacksmith was shoeing his horses almost in the very street. --Christian Herald.

7B's, 7, 7A's, 8, 8B's, 8A's, 0. It will thus be seen that in only four of the groups was there a large reduction in attendance. In no instance did this seem to justify the attempt to consolidate groups of pupils. Accordingly a teacher was retained for each of the sixteen grade groups at Elm Place school. The average enrollment today is about thirty pupils to a classroom.

By way of further comment upon this same point it may be said that it is not altogether the number of pupils in a room which affects the efficiency of the teaching. The uniformity or lack of uniformity of attainment of the pupils has a serious bearing upon that efficiency and that, too, without strict regard to the number of the pupils. This can be illustrated by reference to the two sixth grade groups now at Elm Place. There is a teacher for each group. One has the 23 6B's, the other the 40 6A's. The latter group is too large for one teacher but any attempt at dividing all these sixth grade pupils equally between the two teachers would make conditions worse. It is much easier and more effective in results to teach 40 pupils of the same grade than 30 of two different grades.

Further consideration of the problems of grading and assigning pupils to the different class rooms is reserved for another issue of the Press.

MANY PROPERTY CHANGES NOTED

Improvements Being Made in old Residences of City by new Owners
One of the most beautiful locations and attractive old homesteads of this city, and owned by the B. F. Gump family for twenty-five years on Ravine Drive, has been purchased by R. J. Beatty who bought, several years ago, the residence built by Mr. Gump at 535 Sheridan Road and adjoining the old estate. Many of the landmarks and homesteads have changed owners and are being remodeled until there is no semblance of the old-fashioned houses which, it must be admitted, contain a certain appeal in spite of the inartistic lines. Of recent years the old Cheney house at the corner of Prospect and Dale Avenues, was purchased by Mr. Edgar Snow and rebuilt into a beautiful, modern home as will the Kenneth R. Smoot place at the corner of Prospect and Linden Avenues, now owned by Mr. Ira J. Geer. There is, too, the wonderfully situated white brick home of Samuel Miles Hastings at 220 Dale Ave., which has been twice remodeled since he purchased it from Judge Hibbard, a small white frame house located on a bit of ground entirely surrounded by a wooded ravine, and there is the old Fessenden place so fondly named "Happy-Go-Lucky," which is now owned by the John Tuttle's, emerging from a brick and frame house into a splendid mansion of brick and stone.
Another of Highland Park's old places, the Hay's residence, located at the corner of Sheridan Road and Maple Avenue has been sold and will be rebuilt into a modern and a more attractive house. Mr. F. M. Lowe of Chicago recently purchased the place evidently with the idea of speculation for he divided the lot and sold the south one hundred and fifty feet to Mr. Noble Crandall of Ravinia and the remainder of the lot to Mr. C. A. Winston, a Chicago attorney who will remodel the house. For many past summers the place has been occupied by Mr. Prindle and children of Chicago.
