land Park at the present time is \$77,500.00. Of this amount \$12,000.00 will be retired as of August 1, 1913, leaving a net bonded indebtedness at that time of \$65,500.00. On its present valuation the city

can legally, by vote of the people, issue bonds to the amount of \$90,782.25. Therefore after August 1st next, it will be possible to issue bonds, to take care of the debt of the city to the amount of approximately \$25,000.00.

It seems to me that the only method by which Highland Park can raise for corporate purposes, an amount sufficient to properly take care of the real needs of

the city, is by means of short term bond issues authorized annually according to our necessities by vote of the people. It would not do to increase our assessed valuation for the reason that the city would only get a small percentage of the increased taxation. The needs of the city in the special assessment accounts to take up improvement bonds past due and to pay improvement bonds due July 1, 1913, are so great that there is necessity for the strictest economy as applied to the current year. This however, is a matter that others are better prepared to discuss than I am. Suffice it to say there seems no cause for very much alarm.

Now the question that everyone will ask is, "What can be done to remedy this situation, in so far as it relates to Highland Park's inability to raise sufficient funds except by frequent bond issue to meet its current expenses?" With this end in view, I have a plan to suggest which it seems would be helpful; and at the first regular meeting of the new city council early in May, I shall present the following resolution:

"Resolved, that the Mayor of Highland Park appoint a committee of two members of the City Council, and two other citizens of the City of Highland Park, to meet and discuss the propriety of forming a North Shore Council."

I believe there are many benefits to be derived from an exchange of views and ideas between the towns and villages along the North Shore. There are questions of finance, of road building, of sewage disposal, agreements with public service corporations, questions surrounding our relations with the railroads, a hundred questions where two heads are better than one, where an exchange of ideas and cooperation cannot fail to result in many benefits.

ELM PLACE SCHOOL CENTRALLY LOCATED

District 107 the Elm Place school is fairly central in location. Leaving out of consideration the Port Clinton division, the northern portion of the district, the remainder of the district, west, north, south and southeast of Elm Place school is well served and on fairly equal terms by that school. A careful study of a real estate map of Highland Park leads to such a conclusion. For example, the entrance to the Exmoor Country Club on the west, the intersection of Moraine Road and St. Johns Avenue on the north, and the intersection of Hazel and Ravine Avenues on the southeast are practically equally distant from Elm Place school. The northern end of Exmoor and the southwest corner of the district on Deerfield Avenue are about equally distant from Elm Place and each is not a great deal farther removed than the points just mentioned.

The location of Elm Place well over to the east of the railroad tracks is seen to be geographically correct since two thirds of District 107 lies east of those tracks. The east side is twice as large as the west side, and it has a relatively greater proportion of unoccupied area. Its building up in the near future bids fair to eclipse that of any other portion of the city. During the past three years seventeen new houses have been built within three blocks of Elm Place. The increasing enrolment in the lower grades of pupils living east of the tracks is decidedly noticeable. In the emerging class in September there were 30 pupils from the east side to 20 pupils from the west side.

The writer wishes to lay emphasis upon the matter of the central location of Elm Place school for it has long been his belief that District 107 is not large enough to need outlying schools and that it can best solve its facilities at Elm Place. The type of school the majority of our patrons desire can be more nearly realized by maintaining a central school plant. A much needed kindergarten, a gymnasium with an instructor in physical training, an adequate auditorium, these are some of the things District 107 will probably have to forego if a west side school must be built and maintained at this time.

This point of view the writer will set forth more fully in a later article.
