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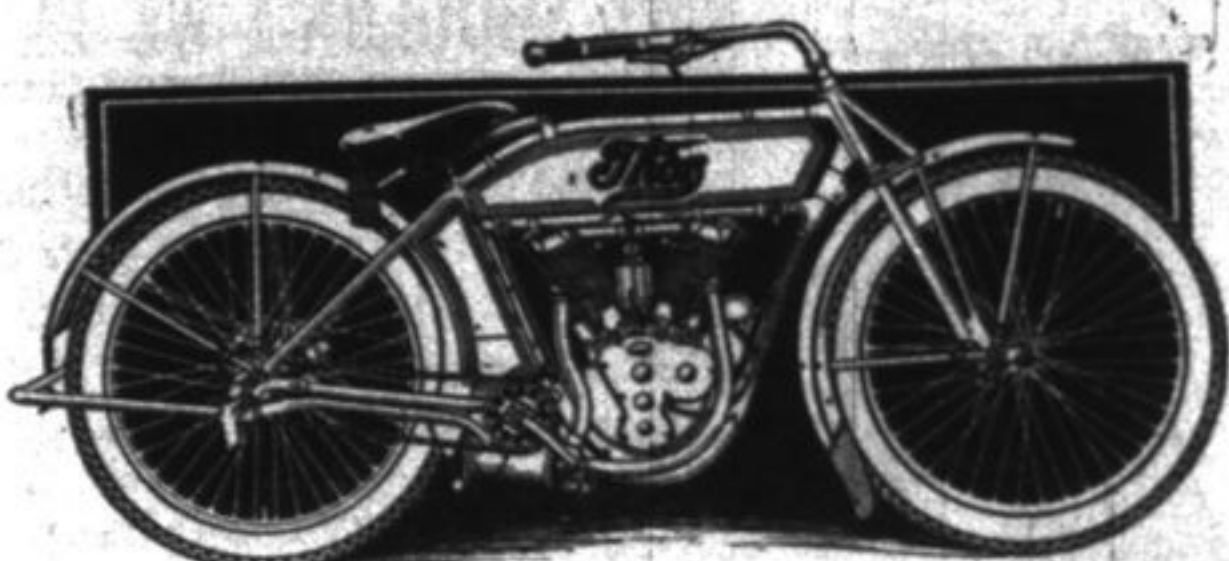
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### Ft. Sheridan Notes

The mothers study class of the South Division has been ever since its organization three years ago, doing wonderful work and has had an encouraging career. On Tuesday afternoon the class enjoyed another of its clever programs when Mrs. Benjamin Page made an address upon "How Shall We Deal with Problems which come with the Adolescence." She gave a well organized talk and spoke ably on how to deal with problems which come with adolescence. A point upon which the speaker dwelt especially was that very often, she said, a boy or girl entering adolescence feels shy in expressing his or her newer thoughts to parents and those who have been accustomed to them as careless children and that they often give more of their confidences to a teacher or some one who is a newly found friend. She expressed the belief that parents could win confidences from their children at this age perhaps best by being confidential with the children themselves and telling of their early struggles and life. The speaker of the day thought that co-education was the most favorable environment for the normal development of boys and girls. She advised the wise answering of questions propounded by the young as always a wise measure rather than evasion.

The address was followed by an interesting discussion participated in by many with the result that the majority expressed the desirability of early chaperonage while children are little and of supervision over children even before they enter the adolescence period. We as mothers, was the decision of the ladies present, should want to be at home when children are at our house playing, and see to it that our children visit others only when their mothers are at home.

Two new books were donated to the children's library of the Lincoln school by members of the class. Following the meeting tea was served by the hostesses who were: Mrs. Joseph Holbrook, assisted by Mrs. Lucius Hine, Mrs. Otis Beardsley and Mrs. Herbert Beers.

Lambert, well known in our local church and formerly assistant superintendent of men at the Moody Institute entered the conference and was appointed to the Adams Street church, Chicago.

Rev. B. R. Schultz is appointed for another year as presiding elder of the Chicago district.
