ILLINOIS PARAGRAPHS

SPRINGFIELD - The Republicans gained two members of the house when Henry M. Ashton, Democrat, and H. W. Harris, the Socialist, were unseated, and Robert R. Jackson, colored, and Edwin T. Farrar, were seated, and the action of the house may have important bearing on the fate of the initiative and referendum resolution.

CHICAGO - Mrs. L. K. Canouse, the wife of Dr. Kirby Canouse, a professor of pathology connected with Mercy hospital, shot and killed herself in her home, 519 East Forty-Ninth street. Mrs. Canouse gave birth to a baby seven weeks ago and has been extremely nervous ever since.
