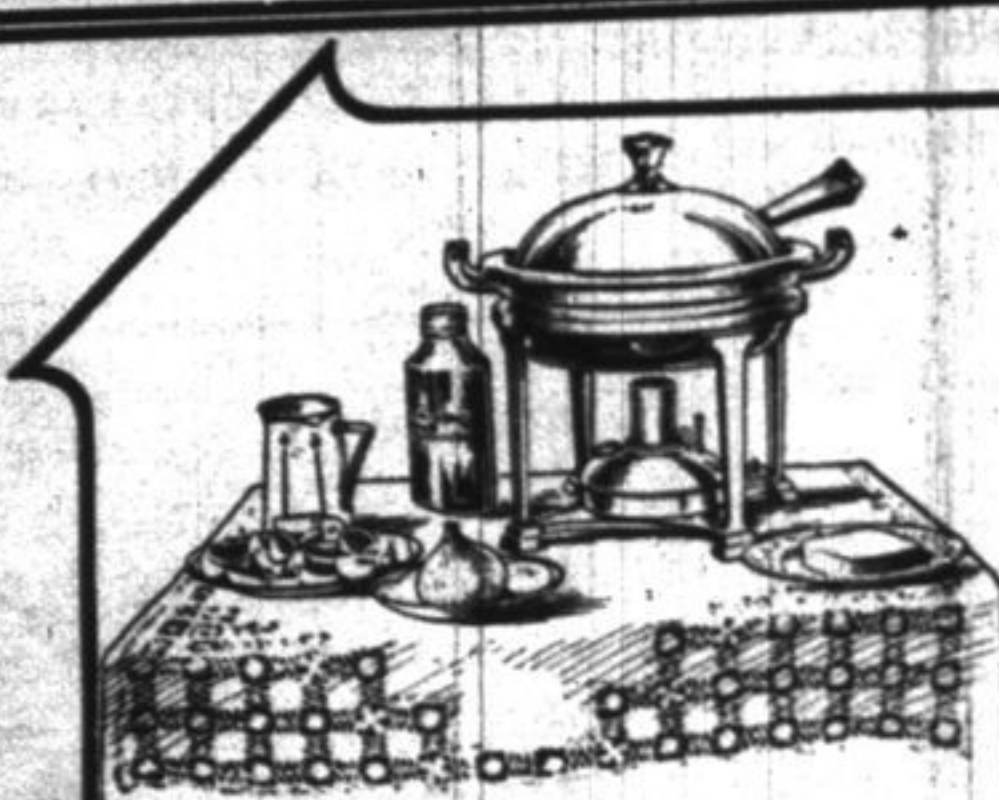

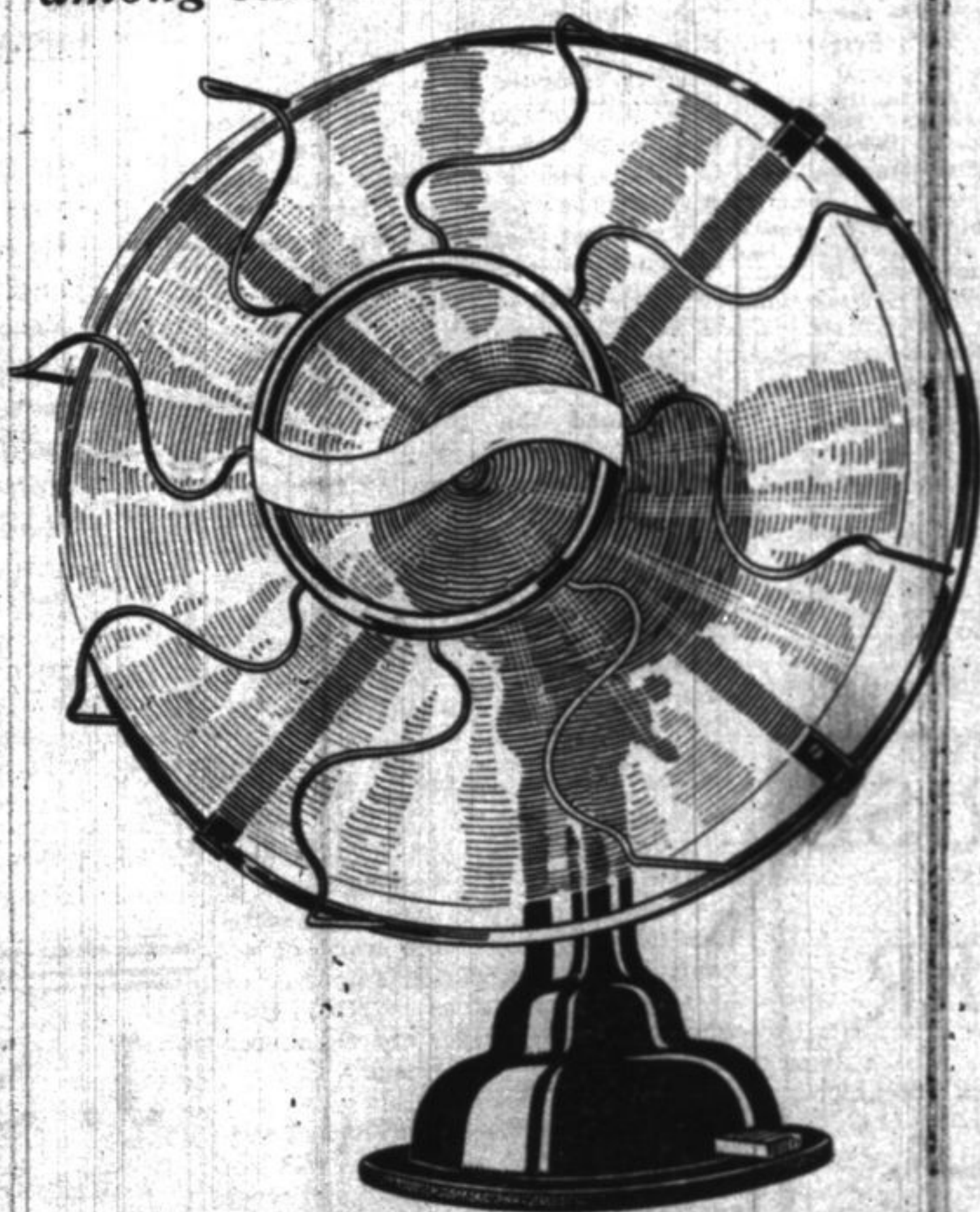

**CATTLE CREMATED**

Wreck on Pennsylvania Line Is Followed by Fire.

**FARMERS GO TO THE RESCUE**

Believing of the Frantic Animals Penned in the Blazing Cars Heard for Miles After the Accident Near Fort Wayne, Ind.—Brakeman Blown Off Roof of Car.

A bad wreck, in which a tank car filled with oil exploded just as a swiftly moving stock train was passing on an adjoining track, six miles east of Fort Wayne, Ind., caused a general tie-up for hours of through east and west bound traffic on the Pennsylvania lines.

One man was blown from the top of the train and badly injured.

Blazing Oil Fires Train.

The blazing oil fired the stock train, and before members of the car crews of both trains and firemen could extinguish the flames ten carloads of live stock had been turned to death. The belching of the panic stricken and frantic cattle was heard for miles and attracted many farmers, who fought the flames.

The animals plunged, gored, kicked and rushed against the side of the cars in desperate efforts to liberate themselves and escape the on-rushing flames and the smoke.

Ten Cars of Stock Destroyed.

Before locomotives could be hitched to the cars to draw them away from the danger zone ten of the stock cars containing the cattle were destroyed.

Besides the brakeman who was injured in the wreck by being blown off a car, others had narrow escapes. Several car men and farmers suffered burns in attempt to extinguish the fire. A wreck train was sent from Fort Wayne, and succeeded in clearing the tracks after several hours' work. A number of trains were delayed by the wreck.

**SIX DROWN AT WAUSAU**

Four Men and Two Girls Victims of Hidden Pier.

The overturning of a motor boat at Wausau, Wis., late Sunday night, resulted in the death of six persons by drowning. The boat struck a "dead-head" and the rudder was broken, allowing the boat to drift helplessly against a submerged pier, which caused it to overturn.

The dead: Herman Roehl, Gus Janke, Eleanor Janke, Gertrude Janke, Walter Janke and Gustav Janke.

**Village of Deerfield, Lake County, Illinois, Notice to Contractors**

Section 1. Sealed proposals will be received by the Board of Trustees of the Village of Deerfield, in the Village Hall of said village until 7 o'clock p. m. of the 26th day of May A. D. 1913, at which time and place said bids will be publicly opened.

Section 2. The work for which bids are asked is the furnishing of all labor and material of every kind and nature, all appliances and appurtenances, for the complete construction and installation of an 8 inch water main, including valves and valve boxes in Deerfield Road from the west limits of Highland Park to the east village limits of Deerfield, including the construction of a meter pit installed with pipes, fittings, specials, meters, fish traps, valves, etc. This work to be completed so as to deliver water to the east village limits of said Town of Deerfield all of which work shall be done according to plans and specifications.

Section 3. Each bidder must file with his bid cash or certified check on some responsible bank doing business in the State of Illinois equal to the amount of not less than 10 per cent of the amount of his bid, such deposit to be returned upon rejection of the bids or upon the filing of satisfactory bond after award of contract. Contractor will be required to file personal or surety company bond of \$10,000 to insure the performance of the work under the contract and to indemnify the Board of Trustees against all liabilities.

Section 4. Plans and specifications are on file with the Village Clerk and at the office of the Engineer, Edgar A. Roessler, 526 Reaser Block, Chicago, Ill. Copy of specification and form of bid may be procured by application. The payments will be made in cash as follows: On or about the 15th day of each month, 85 per cent of the value of the work done during the preceding calendar month, the balance will be paid upon completion and acceptance of the entire work.

The work shall begin on or before 30 days after notice by board of Trustees, A. D. 1913 and contractor shall specify the time of completion and be bound by the same.

The time of completion will be considered in awarding the contract.

The Board of Trustees reserve the right to reject any and all bids.

**ORGAN RECITALS AT ZION CITY**

Famous Instrument may be heard Without Charge at Wednesday Concert

Pipe organ recitals on the famous Zion City instrument, were resumed last Wednesday afternoon and will be continued each Wednesday at 3:30 p. m., throughout the summer. Dr. Hyland Em. Wilson, A. M., graduate of the University of the State of New York, will preside at the organ during these recitals. His skill in handling this wonderful instrument has given delight to many thousands of visitors to Zion City who have attended the recitals in the past and future visitors are cordially invited to attend.

This organ is one of the largest in the world and is composed of seven organs, all controlled from the one console, or keyboard. It has an echo organ, two hundred feet away from the main organ and the vox humana effects produced are so like the human voice as to almost startle one as the voices tremble in the distance. The main organ is forty feet wide, thirty feet deep, twenty feet high and weighs fifty-six thousand pounds. It has two hundred and ninety registers, five thousand, one hundred and twenty-four pipes, one thousand and thirty-three miles of electric wires, twenty-eight miles of cable and twenty chimes. It is operated by a kinetic blower, attached to a ten-horse power motor which furnishes four thousand cubic feet per minute.
