**GENERAL NEWS.**

**MARQUETTE, MICH.**—Col. Theodore Roosevelt has arrived in Marquette to begin his \$10,000 libel suit against Editor George A. Newett of Ishpeming. The advance forces had arrived in the persons of James S. Pound of Detroit, the Colonel's counsel of record; of Henry M. Wallace of Detroit, national committee man for Michigan, who will not appear in the suit although an attorney, but is aiding in the conference now being held by Pound and W. S. Hill, the local Roosevelt attorney. Pound and Hill will try the case for Roosevelt. H. S. Rochems, Roosevelt's personal attorney, appearing as a witness if he comes at all. Horace Andrews of Cleveland, of the firm representing the Cleveland Cliffs Iron company, and W. J. Belden, of the Ishpeming steel trust, an attorney and warm friend of Newett, will handle the defense case. The former plans to have a number of attorneys on each side have been abandoned, and the four men named will carry the burden of the struggle.

**WASHINGTON**—President W. Wilson's attack on the lobby maintained in Washington against the administration's tariff bill fell like a bomb among the opponents of the measure. Those who are opposed to the Underwood bill and who are seeking to have it changed expected a fight, but were not looking for it soon or in such a direct forceful way. The president's statement was immediately interpreted here as notice by him that he is ready to fight for free sugar and free wool to the finish and that he intends to go directly to the people of the country for his support.

**He Wouldn't Respond.**  
When Joaquin Miller's play, "The Danites," was produced for the first time the play caught the crowd's fancy, and at the end of the second act there were great calls from the audience for "Author, author."  
The manager looked around for Miller, but could not find him. He sent several of his assistants all over the theater to hunt Miller up and bring him before the footlights to address the clamorous audience.  
After some time spent in searching Miller was spotted sitting among the crowd was up in the gallery, where the calls "Author" were most numerous. Upon being asked to go down and address the audience, Miller refused, saying that wild horses couldn't drag him down there.—New York Sun.

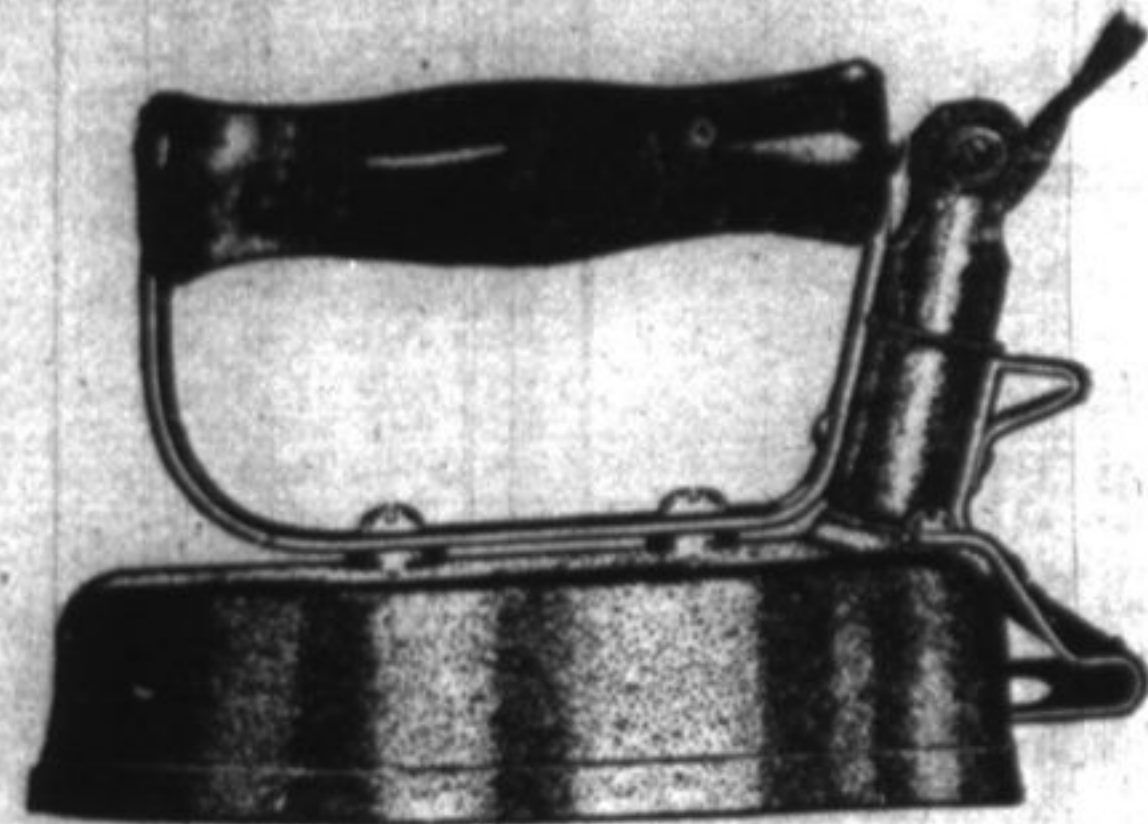

**Lead and the Teeth.**  
A tendency of the teeth and gums to absorb lead has been observed by Vilk for Hines, a German dentist, among the workers in an accumulator factory. The teeth all had much tartar, and that scraped from the teeth of one man affected with anemia and other symptoms of poisoning was found by analysis to contain about one-half of 1 per cent of metallic lead. Extracting the seventeen teeth still retained by this man, the metallic lead in the crowns was shown to be 0.038 per cent and 0.033 per cent in the roots—sufficient to give continuous lead intoxication. The tartar was removed from the teeth of the other workers, and this was followed by marked improvement in the condition of gums and general health.

**SIOUX CITY, IOWA**—After swallowing three tablets of bichloride of mercury Robert Palmer, a cattle salesman and a member of one of the wealthiest families of Sioux City, is awaiting slow death from the poison. Palmer was in a hotel when he took the tablets. He rushed into the street shouting, "I've done it! I've done it!" Reports at the hospital were that Palmer has little hope of recovery. Physicians say he may live from a week to fifteen days. Palmer is resigned to his fate and demands that he be taken to his home to die.

**BOSTON, MASS.**—John J. Breen, a Lawrence undertaker, and at that time a member of the Lawrence school board, who was fined \$500 for "planting" dynamite in various places of that city during the textile strike of 1912, took the stand at the trial of President William B. Wood, of the American Woolen company, Frederick E. Atteaux and Dennis J. Collins for conspiring to plant the explosive, said he received \$700 from Atteaux for doing the job, having received the dynamite from Ernest W. Pittman, now dead.

**NEW YORK**—What is being described by those responsible for it as "a sort of bull moose political bible" is to make its appearance presently. It is a complete edition of the platform of the Progressive party with "notes, explanations, comment and amendments for all since pure Progressives." In addition to this its projectors say that "it will explain all the unexplained features of this remarkable political document that caused all the trouble last year."

**BERLIN**—Andrew Carnegie has an entirely new scheme for world peace which he intends to submit to the Kaiser when he comes here on June 17 to congratulate the German emperor on his peaceful reign of twenty-five years. Mr. Carnegie's plan, which he expects to go into operation as the crowning achievement of Emperor William's reign, is for the Kaiser to take the initiative in reducing armaments and ask the other nations to follow his example.

**WASHINGTON**—The district supreme court here, which originally sentenced Samuel Gompers, John Mitchell and Frank Morrison, the labor leaders, to jail for contempt of court, filed a petition with the supreme court of the United States, asking the highest tribunal to review the decision of the district court of appeals, which affirmed the conviction of the three men, but reduced their sentences.

gift and purchase, as well as by eminent domain.

**SECTION 5. REVERSION TO CORPORATE AUTHORITIES:** WHEN, in case the said Sheridan Road, or any part thereof, shall pass from the control of said The Commissioners of Lincoln Park, the power and authority over the same granted or authorized by this Act shall revert to the proper corporate authorities or park commissioners of such city, town, village, township or park district respectively, aforesaid.

**SECTION 6. CITY, ETC., MAY GRANT CONTROL TO PARK COMMISSIONERS.** Any city, town, village, township or board of park commissioners in this State shall have full power and authority by appropriate ordinance or resolution to vest said The Commissioners of Lincoln Park with the right to take over under the terms of this Act, any of the streets of such city, town, village, township or park district which may be used for the purpose of carrying out the provisions and conditions of this Act.

**SECTION 7. EMERGENCY.** WHEREAS, There is a necessity for the immediate construction or improvement contemplated in this Act; therefore, an emergency exists, and this Act shall take effect from and after its passage.
