ILLINOIS PARAGRAPHS

CHICAGO — Mrs. Mary McElligott, who says her home is at Cleveland avenue, Batavia, Ill., was found unconscious with her skull fractured and her face and body bruised and lacerated in a passageway between two buildings at 2021-2033 West Van Buren street. According to policemen to whom the woman talked at the hospital, Mrs. McElligott came to Chicago from Batavia to visit her son, who lives on Warren avenue, on the west side. Mrs. McElligott says she met two men on the street last Sunday night and that she went with them to Chas. Freed's saloon at West Madison and Hoyne avenue, where they had some drinks. About 1 o'clock in the morning as they were passing the buildings at 2021 and 2033 West Van Buren street, she declared, the men dragged her into the passageway, beat her until she was helpless. They tore off her coat and dress and robbed her of a diamond ring valued at \$150, a wedding ring, which she valued at \$100 and \$52 in cash, she said. She did not know the names of the men, but will be able to identify them.

SPRINGFIELD — President John Fitzpatrick, Vice President Oscar F. Nelson and others of the fifteen officials of the Chicago Federation of Labor in a seven hours' examination were at the bar of the house in contempt proceedings growing out of the federation's resolutions on William Lorimer and the defeat of the initiative and referendum. The committee agreed to recommend to the assembly to dismiss the labor men. All day and all night the fight was against reading their 15,000 word answer. It was not until 11 p. m. that the federation won the fight and the clerk began to read it.

SPRINGFIELD — The King bill, providing for pensions of \$2 a week for persons over seventy years of age whose incomes are less than \$150 a year lacked enough votes for passage in the house. It got six votes less than enough for its passage. Before the vote was announced, Representative King moved to postpone further action. His motion carried, and another vote will be taken next week.

JOLIET — Louis Schauer, who recently married Mrs. Mary Boyle Collins, seventy years old, whose sudden death in Aurora is being investigated by the authorities, disappeared after the funeral in Morris, Ill. The relatives of the woman promise legal action to protect their interests in a

—go escape. A chemist is examining the stomach of the woman.

DANVILLE — Mrs. Mary Barnhart, wife of a Danville street railway motorman, was killed here by an automobile owned by Albert S. Bowers of Tolono and driven by Charles O. Summers of that place. She had just stepped from a car when struck down. Following a coroner's inquest, Summers was arrested on a charge of murder and was locked up.

FREEMONT — Because the Freemont city council was of the opinion that young men motorcyclists were endangering their own lives and the lives of others by carrying their sweethearts as passengers on the machines, the gasoline tax being used as a seat, an ordinance has been passed forbidding "tank-riding" on motorcycles.

FREEMONT — The Federation of Women's clubs of the Thirtieth congressional district, at its annual meeting, elected the following officers: President, Mrs. J. A. Clark, Freemont; recording secretary, Mrs. A. G. Burnham, Dixon; corresponding secretary, Mrs. Frederick Wagner, Freemont; treasurer, Mrs. F. Doty, Amboy.

ELGIN — Life imprisonment was the long sentence imposed by Judge C. F. Irwin in the Kane county circuit court at Geneva on Herman Coppes, the fourteen-year-old state ward, who on April 14, murdered Mrs. Manny Sleep and her two babies on a farm six miles west of Elgin. Coppes had entered a plea of guilty.

MENDOTA — On account of the recent withdrawal of LaSalle from the Illinois Valley Harness Racing association, Mendota has decided to take the dates surrendered by LaSalle, July 1 to 4. In the original assignment, Mendota was given the second week of that month.

DIXON — Cupid has seriously depleted the ranks of the school teachers of Dixon to such an extent that the board of education is in a quandary. Seven of the present teachers will resign at the end of the school year in order to be married.

SPRINGFIELD — The Illinois senate has adopted the age die adjournment resolution presented by Senator W. C. Jones of Chicago fixing the date at June 18 and calling the legislature back on June 28 to consider the vetoes of bills by the governor.

BLOOMINGTON — Elaborate plans are under way for the annual rescue of young fish which are left along the banks of the Illinois and other rivers of the state, following the receding of the water during the summer season.

THE MAN IN THE ORIENT.

He Walks Ahead of His Wife to Guard Her From Danger.

When husband and wife go traveling together in the orient the man walks in front, careless and free, and the woman walks behind, carrying the bundle. Therefore you say: "The oriental cares not for his woman. He despises his wife and uses her as a beast of burden." Most occidentals never get further than that. But if you are observant you go out in the jungle yourself, and you discover things. When you walk abroad there are difficulties and dangers. Thus the Japanese, the Burman, goes in front of his wife for the same reason that the occidental goes behind— from courtesy. If he continues to do so when it is unnecessary, as in towns where there are roads, it is because a convention once formed is hard to break, east or west.—H. Piddling-Hall in Atlantic Monthly.

A DOG IN A GALE.

Able to Keep His Feet Where a Man Would Be Blown Away.

A gale that blows a man off his feet does not bother a dog at all. He will run about unconcernedly while his master walks with the greatest difficulty. This is for the same reason that a high building is more affected than a low one by a gale. It is also because the dog has four legs to support his body, while a man has only two.

With topside set a yacht would capsize in a gale which it would ride out with safety if only its lower sails were set, for the leverage exerted by the wind increases in proportion to the height at which the sails are set. A man by reason of his height receives far more force from the wind than does a dog.

Then, again, a dog's center of gravity is much lower in proportion to his height than is a man's; consequently he is not nearly so top-heavy. And it is obvious that any object supported on four legs is more stable than if supported on two.—St. Louis Post-Dispatch.
