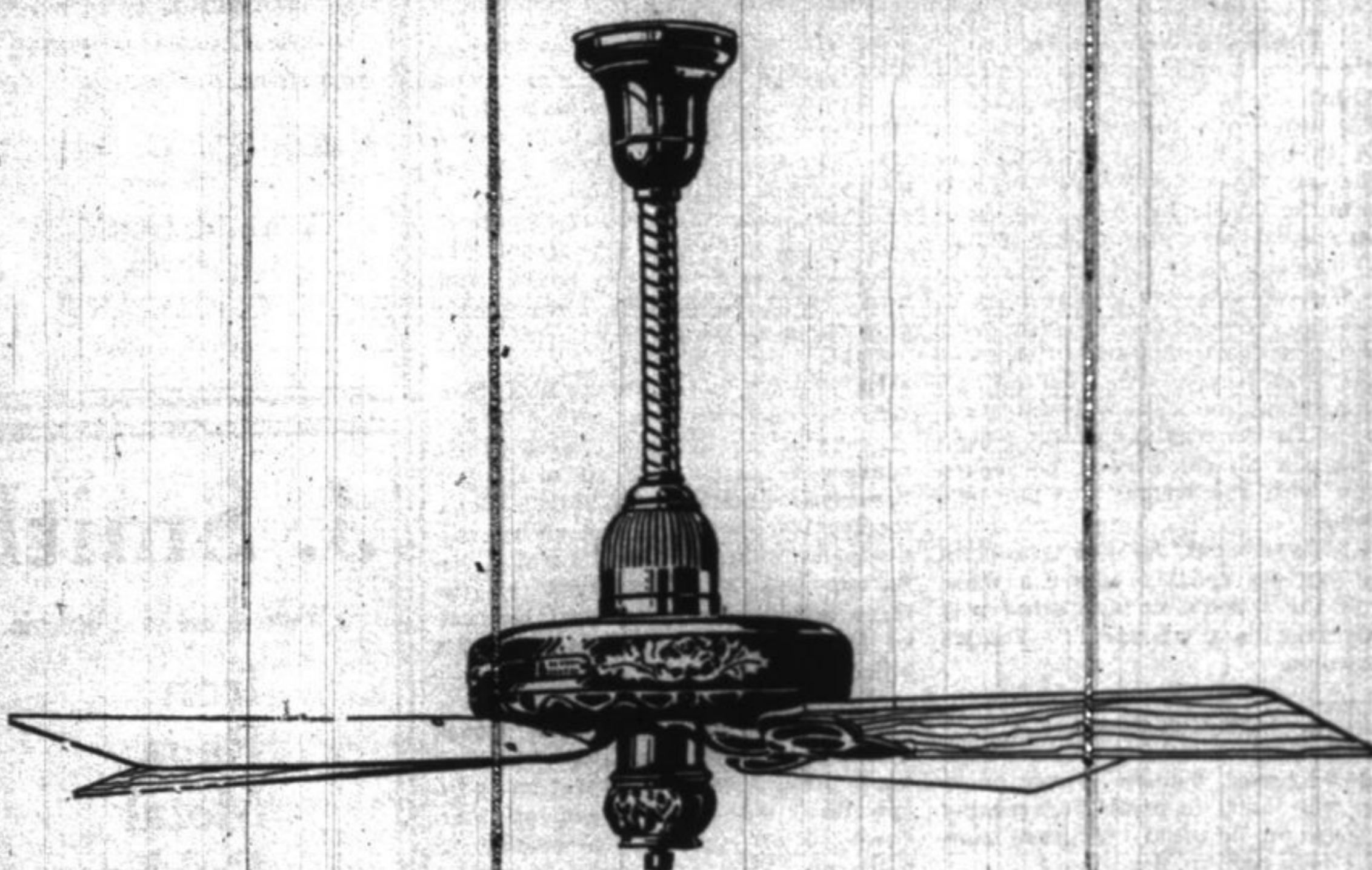

Obituary

John Clark Cushman, who died at his residence yesterday was born at Ft. Covington, N. Y., August 21, 1835.

In 1855 he came to Chicago and became a clerk in the old Galena and Chicago Union Railway Co. The next year he removed to Plymouth, Marshall Co., Ind., where he remained until after the Chicago fire. During this period he served seven years as clerk of Marshall county. He took an active part in public life during the exciting period of the civil war.

In 1870 he was elected secretary and director of the Plymouth, Kankakee and Pacific Railroad Company, later known as the Indiana, Illinois and Iowa Railroad, now a part of the Lake Shore system. Owing to his knowledge of its early business he became associated with this road during his later years and retained this connection until his health compelled him to retire.

In 1871 he entered the firm of Cameron, Amberg & Co., but later became interested in the manufacture of pressed brick, then a new industry in Chicago. From 1876 to 1900 he was a resident of Highland Park. He was a member of the Episcopal church and served during the eighties in Diocesan standing committees, etc. He was life member of the A. O. Fay Lodge of Masons and a Past Master. He was a thirty second degree Mason; a member of Apollo Commandery W. I. K. T., Generalissimo 1886-Prelate 1881-3 and Grand Prior Oriental Consistory S. P. R. S.

He served in the city of Highland Park ably and efficiently as an alderman for several years in the early nineties.

At the time of his death he resided at 6030 Jackson Park Ave. He leaves a widow, Ellen S. Cushman and a daughter, Lillian S., an instructor in the University of Chicago. The burial will be at Lake Forest on Friday.

Obituary

Mrs. Sarah R. Look. On Monday afternoon, May 26, at the residence of her daughter, Mrs. E. H. Brown of Panama City, Florida, formerly of this city, occurred the death of Mrs. Sarah R. Look, age eighty-seven years, ten months and eight days. Mrs. Look was born July 18, 1825 and was a lineal descendant of Sampson Mason, one of Cromwell's Ironsides, who came to the colony of Massachusetts about 1640, and who was one of the founders of the first Baptist church. Mrs. Look was taken sick Thursday night. A physician was called and

pronounced her case as being a hemorrhage in the brain. She was in an unconscious state from the time she was taken ill until her death at 3:20 p. m. Monday. The funeral services were held Monday, interment being in Oakland cemetery. Rev. Skinner of the Baptist church of Panama City officiated. Surviving Mrs. Look is a son, William E., and a daughter, Mrs. E. H. Brown of Panama City, Fla.
